## LAS VEGAS CLUB IS COMING FOR THREE GAMES THIS WEEK

### Albuquerque Grays Will Take a Final Crack at Meadow City Club Before the Aggregation Disbands for Season.

On Friday, Saturday and Sunday of this week the Las Vegas baseball club will be in Albuquerque for a final series of three games with the Grays. The Maroons will disband in Albuquerque for the season Sunday night and Lawrence E. Clark, who is to come here with the club as manager, will return to the Meadow City with the uniforms and other paraphernalia. The Maroons will be permitted to keep all the money they make at the series. As they will play on the sixty and forty per cent basis, the sixty per cent going to the winner it is safe to say that they will play hard to win. Manager Dan Padilla of the Grays believes that he did not have a fair crack at the Pirates on the last trip to Las Vegas. When he went into the series, Dan was short nearly all the good players on the club. Corbush, Lombard, Kutz, Mose Chavez, Pete Hidalgo, De Blas and Gonzalez, and was obliged to pick up some not very heavy material here and in Santa Fe. With the pick of all the ball players in town by the coming series, and strengthened by the return of Bert Graham, who has been playing in the Southern League, there is reason to believe that Albuquerque will take three straight from the Maroons.

## FULGHUM RELEASED HAVING MARRIED SALAZAR GIRL

### Rancher Who Got Into Some Trouble Because of Improper Conduct Evades Prosecution by Government.

Evidently preferring to marry the 15-year-old girl who it was alleged he had seduced, than to stand trial on the charge before a federal jury, John Fulghum, a rancher, was today practically absconded from custody by the United States government, following investigation of the same against him by the United States grand jury. The grand jury returned a charge against Fulghum, Mary Salazar, who was relied upon as chief witness for the government, stated when called today to testify before the jury that she and Fulghum had been married and that she wished to claim her right as a wife not to testify against her husband. It is not known where Fulghum and the Salazar girl were married, but it is believed the marriage was performed in Valencia county.

When Fulghum was arraigned for a preliminary hearing before United States Commissioner H. R. Whiting six weeks ago, a Mrs. Fulghum of Santa Fe, who was at that time Fulghum's wife, appeared and testified against him. Mrs. Fulghum at that time had an action for divorce pending in Santa Fe county and it is supposed that soon thereafter she received a decree. Fulghum being again single, he was free to marry the Salazar girl, thus avoiding further prosecution on the charge against him. This he evidently did, as was indicated by the development in the case when taken up by the federal grand jury today.

Judge Ira A. Abbott, sitting in the federal court this afternoon, excused the federal and petit juries until tomorrow morning. It is believed that adjournment and a final report will come tomorrow.

## GRAND JURY WILL PROBABLY MAKE REPORT SOON

### Committee to Interview Business and Professional Men of Albuquerque in Matter of Much Importance.

Within the next few days it will be up to the business and professional men and baseball fans of Albuquerque to say whether Albuquerque will have a baseball club at the state fair that will be a credit to the city and that will stand some show of winning first money in the tournament. It is hoped that this will see the matter in the right light when the committee calls upon them within the next few days. Albuquerque should not expect Santa Fe, Las Vegas, El Paso and Amarillo, Texas to send baseball clubs to Albuquerque to play during the fair if Albuquerque itself does not respond liberally with money to get a first class club of its own.

## GOVERNORS TO TALK AT PUBLIC LANDS CONVENTION

### Seventeen of Them Will Be in Attendance and Six Will Make Addresses; Many Able Speakers on the List.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 18.—Men who are authorities on subjects vital to the development of the west will address the Public Lands convention at Denver, September 28 to October 3. Governors of seventeen states are expected to attend and six of them will read papers on important subjects. Senators and congressmen from these states will take part in the discussion. Governors who will talk will be Governor John F. Whitcraft of Colorado, Chester H. Aldrich of Nebraska, William Stry of Utah, Joseph M. Carey of Wyoming, Joseph H. Hawley of Idaho, and Edwin L. Norris of Montana.

The convention is regarded as the most important gathering of representative people that has ever been called. The list of speakers and their subjects are as far selected, follows:

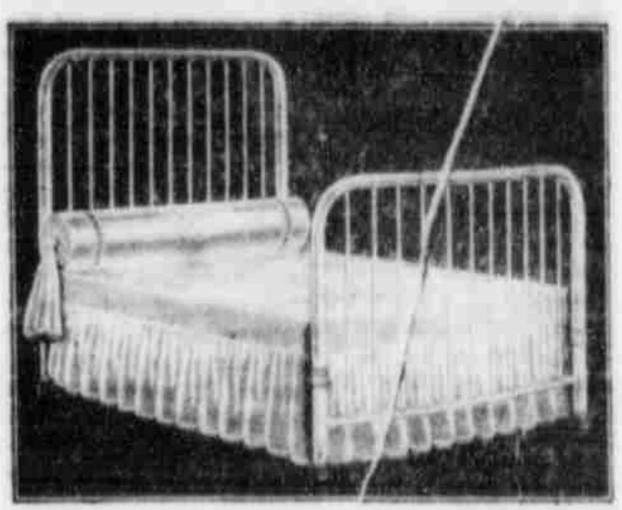

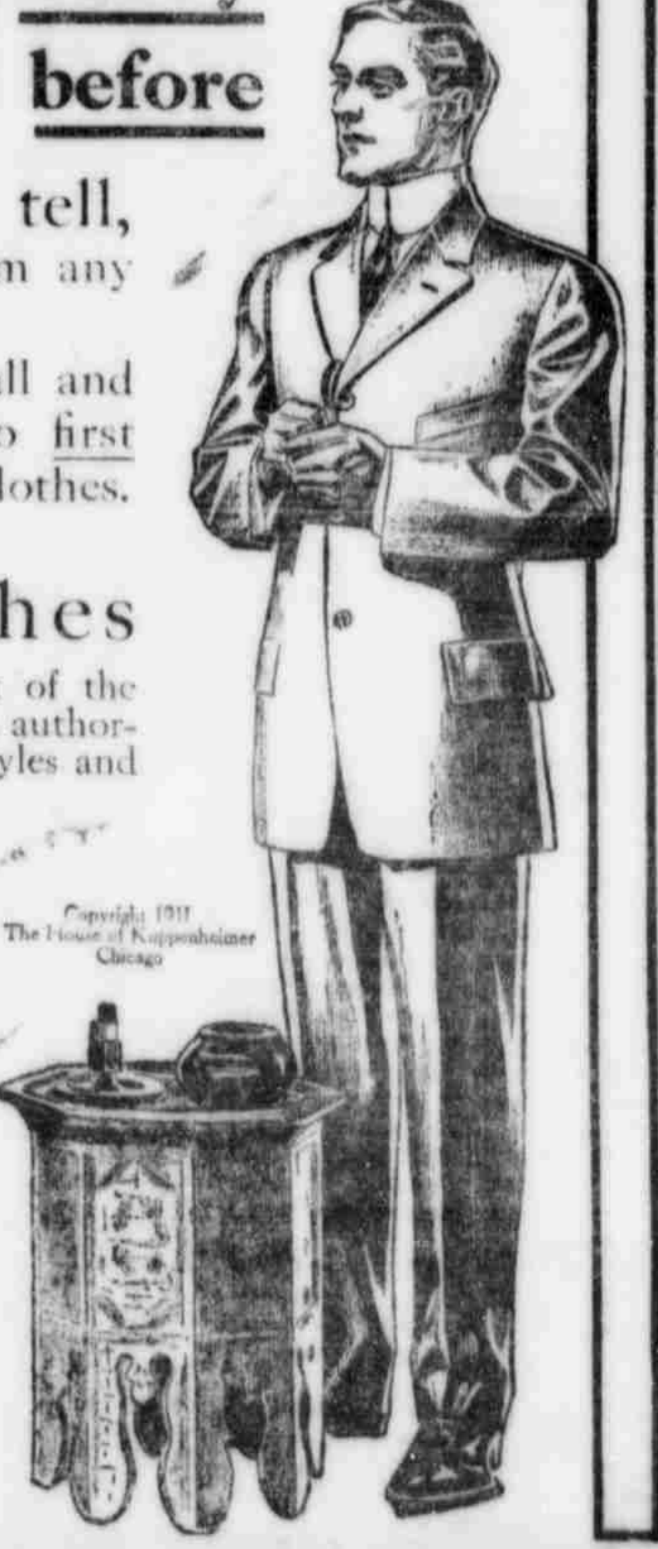
