

RADICALS SHOW DISPOSITION TO MAKE TROUBLE AT CONVENTION

Hand Bills Passed Around in Legislative Hall Today, Denouncing So-Called "Bosses," and Giving Fair Warning That Steam Roller Methods Will Not Be Tolerated Causes Sensation; Young Bloods Refuse to Stand Hitched and Are Causing Great Embarrassment to Leaders.

An open breach in the Democratic state convention is reported to have taken place last night, although the convention was not in session.

This announcement was made when the convention met this morning and a large number of members were handed to the delegates setting forth these facts.

Summers Barkhart of Albuquerque, secretary of the Democratic state committee was openly denounced as a self-contributed Democratic boss.

O. N. Marron was opposed for a place on the ticket as state treasurer, it being declared that he wanted to put the state funds in the state National bank of Albuquerque.

W. B. Walton of Grant county and W. H. Metcalf of Roosevelt county were denounced as being too close to the Santa Fe railway and other corporate interests for places on the ticket.

Judge Metcalf was the son held out to eastern New Mexico, but a majority of the Democratic votes being over there the delegates felt that they were entitled to more on the state ticket than Judge Metcalf represented.

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 4.—With every indication that the Democratic state convention will last for another day and night and possibly until Sunday and that it will result in either a bad split or the nomination of a radical ticket that cannot be reconciled with the progressive Republican element, the handful of Democratic bosses who have sought to run the convention by iron clad states, and steam roller methods, faced the worst crisis today in the history of their party.

A C. Torres of Socorro county is being urged for lieutenant governor in an effort to make a fight on H. O. Harman among the native people of that county. Antonio Lacero is the state man for secretary of state.

It will largely depend on what changes they make in the balance of the slate. At 7 o'clock this afternoon it was the intention of the slate makers to nominate W. C. McDonald for governor this evening. Whether he will be nominated will depend upon what happens at the caucus of the bosses just before his name is sprung on the convention.

The bosses believe they have side-tracked Mr. Ferguson on some other job than United States senator. It is said by some that he will be endorsed for member of congress, and by others that he will hold out with the aid of the old line Democrats, and be endorsed for the senate.

The bosses still are desperately trying to put the hand wagon back together and get it into shape for the rough journey it will have when it is pulled by the Democratic mule and the progressive goat.

A circular which made its appearance here today caused one of the sensations of the convention. It openly threatened the Democratic bosses with a bill by the newer element in that party if the bosses tried to steam roller the convention in the interests of a state. It is the worst attack the bosses of Democracy ever got into and they are up in arms as to how to get out.

It is said that H. B. Ferguson should have the nomination in the twinkling of an eye if he wanted to break the slate, and even at this late day, his friends are urging him to do it. O. N. Marron could break the combination and be nominated for governor if he would but say the word. In fact, right now, it is believed the bosses would secretly be glad to have either one of these men follow them from their embarrassing position, and Mr. McDonald until the poll of counties has been called cannot feel sure of the nomination.

Orders of United States Commerce Commission, Which Were to Have Become Effective Soon, Questioned.

Eminent Scottish Surgeon Taught A. Conan Doyle, Author of Mysterious Crimes

London, Oct. 4.—Joseph Bell, the eminent Scottish surgeon, who was the original of the character of Sherlock Holmes, died today at Mortons, Milton, Strath, Midlothian. He was born in Edinburgh in 1827, and was an instructor of Conan Doyle at Edinburgh university. His hobby was the study of mysterious crimes.

COWBOYS PERFORM WILD WEST STUNTS FOR PRESIDENT IN CHEYENNE

Chief Executive Watches the Broncho Busters; Takes Automobile Ride, and Makes a Speech on Tariff Vetoes.

WYOMING IS SOLIDLY SURELY REPUBLICAN

Chief Executive Watches the Broncho Busters; Takes Automobile Ride, and Makes a Speech on Tariff Vetoes. In addition to the show, the president's program here included an automobile ride through the city, a review of troops and an address in the local opera house. His train is scheduled to make two more stops in Wyoming today and should reach Salt Lake City, Utah tomorrow.

Charles Train, who ran the miniature frontier day show for Mr. Taft's benefit, had a program arranged with some unusual features. In the riding, looking and outfit before they were paraded named "Bill Taft," "Archibald," "Senator Warren," "Schedule K," "Hepburn" and "Teddy Roosevelt."

"Bill Taft" threw Jack Martin, his rider, before he had gone a hundred feet. Frank Carter, an ex-champion hunter of the world, stood close to "Archibald." "Schedule K" was mastered by Clayton Banks, another ex-champion, but "Teddy Roosevelt" proved too strenuous a buck for Paul Hansen.

Mr. Taft stood with Senator Warren and Governor Carey of Wyoming in the audience for an hour and a half and watched the "stunts." He shook hands with the "hunters" with Charles Train and his daughters who appeared in several events. The review of troops before the train were paraded named "Bill Taft," "Archibald," "Senator Warren," "Schedule K," "Hepburn" and "Teddy Roosevelt," still smiling, serene and with shoulders upright. The president in his remarks complimented himself largely to a discussion of his tariff bill vetoes.

TAFT POPULAR IN WYOMING. The Tribune says concerning Taft's visit to Cheyenne: "The warm welcome President Taft received in the capital of Wyoming today indicates that the state is still Republican by a large majority and believes in the wise administration of President Taft. His visit of the wool fall is heartily endorsed by this state."

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
