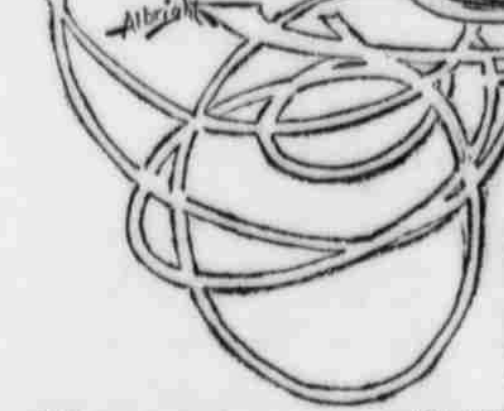


# IN SOCIETY
