

BLUE BALLOT CONDEMNED BY ARCHBISHOP PITAVAL IN STATEMENT TODAY

PROMINENT PRELATE SAYS GRAVITY OF SITUATION COMPELS HIM TO SPEAK NOW

Head of Catholic Church in New Mexico Declares That Amendment Proposed to the Constitution Means Chaos in the Public Affairs of New Mexico and Will Prevent Any Kind of Stable Government; Business Would Suffer; Our People Would Be Injured and Future Prosperity of New State Would Be Greatly Jeopardized.

The most Rev. J. B. Pitaval, D. D., archbishop of Santa Fe, who has been absent this summer and is staying in New York City till the middle of November, has sent the following communication to New Mexico.

"Of all the evils that threaten the future of our country, the most serious is the proposed amendment to the constitution of New Mexico. It is a measure which would destroy the stability of our government and the welfare of our people."

"If our present constitution should prove faulty or inadequate, or if changing conditions should make a change of the constitution really desirable, it can be changed and will be changed, as provided in the present constitution."

"But only a real advantage to the commonwealth as a whole would induce a change, whilst, if the proposed amendment should obtain a majority in the coming election our constitution would change with every changing majority and with every changing party coming into power. The consequence would be to make the foundation of every political, domestic and every family habit, diverging interests of the different sections of the country and of different classes of people inhabiting our state could never be permanently reconciled, and a constant state of political unrest and turmoil would be the consequence."

"That, however, is not exactly what New Mexico stands in need of just at the present time. Stability, restfulness and a sense of security is needed above all if stability is to be coincident with an increased development of our vast natural resources, followed by prosperity for every class of people of our new state."

"It is not a question of politics or of party and I am confident that they who share my convictions in this matter will not only cast their ballot in respect to party affiliations for the stability of our fundamental laws, but will also try to enlighten others."

"It is not my want to appear in print, but the vital importance of this matter and my ardent desire for the welfare, the progress and prosperity of New Mexico have induced me to make an exception this time and to pen these few lines."

The dispatch to the Chung Sai Yat Po puts the imperial loss in the Hankow battle at 3,000 killed, besides many wounded now cared for by the Red Cross society of the revolutionists. A cable to the Tai Tung Yat Ho, a rival paper, however, said the government lost only 2,000.

STRONG SENTIMENT FOR LAFOLETTE IN DAKOTA

The president is in the best of health and is standing the trip remarkably well. His voice is holding up splendidly and his wonderful carrying power is being constantly demonstrated upon. Speaking in the clear air of this hilly country, Mr. Taft can be heard a block away. Undoubtedly the president's health is largely due to the diet which has been prescribed for him by Major L. Thomas Rhoades of the army, his official physician. Mr. Taft probably does not know the extent to which his food supplies are limited, but so far he has not complained. His fellow travelers in the private car local, Secretary Hillock, Major and Major Rhoades are taking something of an advantage of the chief in this respect. For instance the president is denied all pastry. Yesterday for luncheon the cook baked a savory hot apple pie. Every one in the car knew about it, except the president. When he asked for dessert, they supplied him with fruit. Then when the midday meal was over the conspirators retired to one of the staterooms, where a table had been set for the pie. They feasted royally on the forbidden pie in privacy while the president sat alone and neglected in the observation end of his car, wondering what had become of his staff. They say they got in on the news of the deed, there is a lot of lip-talking and the word is passed along the line to stand by and prepare for something "like nothing and to make." Some say the president is going to discover the low descent that is being practiced on him, and there is going to be a real war.

MINISTER TO APPEAR IN COURT ON DAY HE WAS TO HAVE BEEN WEDDED

Police Begin Gathering Evidence Against Rev. V. T. Richeson, Accused of Causing Death of Girl.

PRISONER REMAINS COOL AND SILENT

Suspect Resigns Charge as Pastor of Baptist Church; Father of Fiancee Believes Him Innocent of Crime.

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Boston, Mass., Oct. 21.—Rev. V. T. Richeson, pastor of the Immanuel Baptist church of Cambridge, awake today somewhat refreshed, to begin his first full day in the county jail, where he is to remain until Tuesday, October 31, the date which had been set for his marriage to Miss Violet Edmonds, daughter of Moses Grant Edmonds, a wealthy resident of Brookline.

Instead of being married on that day the minister will appear in court on the charge of murdering his former sweetheart, Miss Avis Linnell, a student at the New England Conservatory of Music, and a Sunday school teacher at Tremont Temple.

Today the police began gathering evidence in the case. The actual delivery of the poison to Miss Linnell and the identity of the person with whom she died last Sunday evening are matters of vital interest being inquired into.

Chief Dugan claims to have learned that Mr. Richeson died last Saturday at the home of Mrs. Frank H. Riley of Somerville, a member of the Immanuel Baptist church. According to the police Mrs. Riley said that on this occasion she threw herself on a couch and explained that she had lost a dear friend and that she had died of convulsions. The police want to know how the minister knew this friend died of convulsions.

The police also are working on the statements made by John P. Dunsin of Cambridge, that his wife heard Richeson talking to Miss Linnell at the Young Women's Christian association building to meet him Saturday.

Richeson remains cool and silent. He has made no statement, says Chief Inspector Dugan.

Richeson this afternoon resigned as pastor of the Immanuel church.

Miss Edmonds, father of Richeson's fiancee, called at the jail this afternoon and had long talk with the prisoner. Mr. Edmonds reiterated his belief in the innocence of the prisoner.
