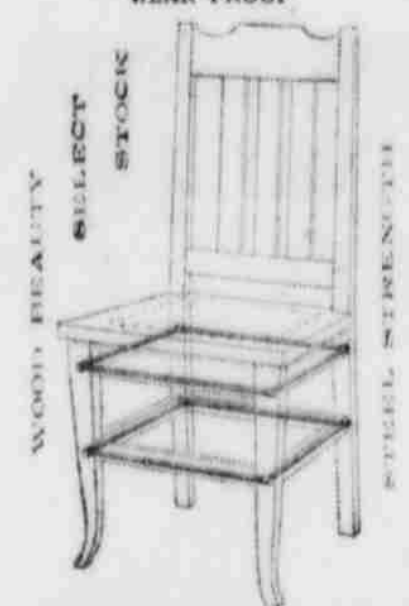


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ACTIVITIES RESUMED AT SEVEN LAKES OIL FIELDS

Bad Roads Made Further Work Impossible Until Repaired: Graded Highway Is Built.

Flatop, N. M., Oct. 24.—After a considerable delay or general activities at the drilling of fields that was caused principally by the defective road beds over which heavy machinery was endeavoring to convey the heavy drilling outfits. Activities have again been resumed and there are three machines now in actual operation in the fields.

It was necessary to build a new road nearly sixty feet in the distance from Chavez to the oil fields in order to move the heavy machinery and traction engines over the ground. Thomas Loden and Morris Young have been away from Flatop nearly two months supervising the construction of this road work. One of the machines on the field is operating on No. 3, top 17, range 3, all the others on No. 12, top 18, range 17, west. A light machine is located a 1/8 mile southeast of the field.

The Taylor oil company, which is equipped principally of Albuquerque men are hurrying to get machinery on the ground in order to get started on the deep well for which they have closed a contract. They expect their machinery to arrive in a very short time. With the recent improvements on the road the work with this heavy material will be less difficult and after the road arrives it will be in actual operation on the field.

Considerable experimenting has been done at the Tallie-Hick well, and these experiments have proven a great encouragement at every movement. Constant pumping has been carried on at the well for several consecutive days and the well is now producing about twenty barrels of a high grade oil per day.

The large oil concerns of various parts of the country are still sending representatives to the field, some of them sending their men back for the

third or fourth time. Each visit impresses them more and more that there is a great possibility for securing a large field of good oil. A deal has just been closed by the Irving Trust company, representing a 300,000-acre tract of land near the town of Tatum, Oklahoma, and the Irving Trust has assumed control of the tract and is making a large investment in the development of the field. It is expected that the oil will be produced in a few years and the field will be one of the great oil fields of the future.

W. H. Flannery, a representative of the Irving Trust company, arrived in Gallup from Albuquerque this week. He has had headquarters at that place for the past four months, having visited the field and made a most favorable impression with the situation that he returned to the company that it would be to their interest if he were located at a point in immediate proximity to the field. He was therefore transferred to this city where he has established headquarters. He arrived here Tuesday and the following day left for the field where the development people have located on eight sections of land. When interviewed Mr. Flannery made the following statement: "The people of Gallup and the surrounding community little realize or what production importance this oil field is to them. I was at Tatum, Oklahoma, and at Beaumont, Texas when either was but a flag station and was then given to a city of 25,000 in a week. The Gallup field now looks better today than the Beaumont field ever did at any time. The great gathering began to flow at this place."

P. M. Lincks, who is a practical driller, and has worked in many fields from Mexico City to Bakerfield, California, went to the Gallup oil field and set up a No. 22 Star drilling outfit for the Gallup association, and now has a contract with that company to do their drilling. He was so well pleased with the outlook upon an arrival here that he located for himself.

P. B. Perry has just returned from the field where he has made further locations for several parties. Pickett and Comer company have a No. 22 Star drilling outfit on the field. A much larger drill, a No. 28 Star drill, has been unloaded at Chavez by A. G. Crain of Houston, Ohio. He has a contract with the Irving Trust oil company.

SANTA FE WILL ICE CALIFORNIA FRUIT IN BELEN YARDS

One of Most Modern Refrigerating Plants in Southwest Now Under Construction in Cut Off Town.

Special Correspondence to the Herald: Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 24.—With the near approach of the winter and the county commission in Valencia county, interested parties to rise in the name of that county. Native and American born alike are taking an interest in it greater than ever before, and it is thought that the convention will be a busy affair. Notices have been posted calling the convention for Friday, October 27, at the county court house in Los Lunas. The delegates representing Belen precinct will be chosen at a primary to be held today. Belen precinct as a rule has considerable say in the nomination of certain of the officers on the ticket, and it is rumored that a number of residents of this precinct will succeed in having their names favorably proposed to the delegates at the county convention.

Work on the new ice plant, which is being erected in Belen by the Kansas Ice company of Newton, Kan., is progressing very satisfactorily. An increased force of men is expediting the work as much as possible, in an effort to complete everything by very early spring, so that the contract with the Santa Fe Railway company may be put into operation at the earliest possible moment.

The plant, when completed, will be one of the best in the southwest, with a daily capacity of 100 tons of ice. The plant, which is being erected largely on a contract with the Santa Fe Railway company to ice the fruit cars coming from California at this point, will be built with this special purpose in view. In addition to this wholesale business the company is laying plans to deliver ice to retail customers in Belen next year.

The workmen have recently completed the erection of two dwelling houses which will be used by officials of the company. A large force of men experienced in the erection of ice houses is now at work in Belen. The plant is located at the south end of the Santa Fe railroad yards here, and covers considerable area.

The Federal Livestock and Land company is a new industry in Belen. It is a company incorporated under the laws of the territory of New Mexico for the purpose of raising sheep, and it is incorporated at \$25,000. Work has already been commenced for the coming season, and in a very short time the company will be running a large herd of sheep. The directors of the company are striving hard to get the best sheep possible so that the business may be a very stable one. R. E. Brown, a man who has had several years' experience in the sheep business in central New Mexico, is in charge of the field work of the corporation. That the sheep may and the successful raising of an assured flock. Already a considerable share of the stock has been secured, but the directors have placed upon the market 5,000 shares of the company for sale at once. With this block of stock disposed of the company will be sufficiently well provided to practically insure its success from the start.

FOREST SUPERVISORS MEET NOVEMBER 9

Forester Ringland Makes Arrangements for Conference of Chiefs of Various Departments of Service.

District Forester A. C. Ringland has returned from El Paso where he went to make the preliminary arrangements for the holding of a meeting of the supervisors and deputy supervisors in charge of forests in the district to be held November 9.

There will be about thirty-five forest officials present, and the chief topic of discussion will be fire protection and fire prevention. It is expected that a number of officers from District 7, the administrative district at Washington, will be present, possibly including Henry B. Graves, the forester.

The foresters of Districts 2 and 5 have been invited to attend from their headquarters in Denver and San Francisco, respectively, and may be present.

Mr. Ringland arranged for a place of meeting in the federal building in El Paso, and for hotel accommodations for the party. El Paso was chosen as a meeting place on account of its central location. As the third forest district extends from the western boundary of Arizona to the eastern boundary of Florida, with forests in all the intervening southern states and territories except Texas, a central location was imperative in order not to work a hardship on the men attending.
