A MONUMENT OF GOOD ROADS BUILDING.

That Is the Way Territorial Engineer Miller Describes Magdalena-Mogollon Road: Is In Excellent Condition.

(Special Telegram to Evening Herald) El Paso, Texas, Oct. 23.—J. D. Miller, territorial engineer of New Mexico, who is in the city, being on a tour of New Mexico, where road construction is now under way, made the following statement today concerning the good roads movement in New Mexico.

I consider the work done upon the roads in New Mexico for the money expended one of the best showings of progress and enterprise in the southwest.

I recently went over the Magdalena-Mogollon road, which I consider an important link, because it is part of the transcontinental road, it is important too, not only to the citizens of Socorro county but to the entire southwest. Twenty miles of that road is already built, having been built by Hain O. Harson 25 years ago.

DULLEST MARKET OF MANY WEEKS IS RECORDED

Prices Ruled Steady Without Material Changes Except for Some of the Industrials, Which Developed Strength.

His Evening Herald A. P. Leonard writes New York, Oct. 23.—The stock market diffused itself through the morning session which was the dullness of many weeks.

The government cotton futures report was contained in a bulletin for stocks, but the only activity which it produced was in the cotton market.

American tobacco bonds moved upward, the gains being a point, on the announcement that one of the tobacco firms would come out with the organization plan on consolidation of being freed from control by the company.

New York City banks made no part of its recent heavy loss. Announcement of a loss of \$1,000,000, despite the loss inflicted on the company by the burning of a large smelter.

Chicago Market. Chicago, Oct. 25.—Prospects of a large yield in the Argentine offsetting whatever shortage there may be in other countries lowered the wheat market today by several cents.
