THOMAS INSLEY IS FOUND GUILTY IN SECOND DEGREE

After Being Out of the Court Room Only About An Hour, Jury Finds Accused Man Murdered John A. Higgins.

The jury in the case of Thomas A. Insley, charged with the murder of John A. Higgins, his brother-in-law, on March 7, last night found him guilty of murder in the second degree. The jury had been out of the court room only about an hour.

Insley may be sentenced anywhere from three years to a life term in the penitentiary. His attorneys gave notice of an exception to the decision and of a motion to appeal.

The jury retired into the jury room yesterday afternoon at 4:55 o'clock. Shortly before 6 o'clock they signified their intention of coming out again, when the court notified them that they would be taken to supper soon. Court was hurriedly rearranged for the hearing of the verdict. Attorneys were called to the court room, one of them from a barber's chair, and just as the clock struck 6, Thomas Insley was brought in to hear his fate. Foreman W. E. Grimmer of the jury handed Clerk T. K. D. Maddison the verdict. It was as follows:

"We, the jury, find the defendant guilty of murder in the second degree. W. E. Grimmer, foreman."

"Is this your verdict?" asked Mr. Maddison after reading it aloud. "It is," the jury replied in English or Spanish, according to their nationality.

Then every one turned to see how Insley had received the news. The man who in the last ten seconds had become a convicted criminal still sat, gray and unresponsive at the end of the counsel's table, staring straight before him.
