 Mrs. J. H. O'Reilly Secures First Permit to Build Summer Cottage in Sandias on National Forest.  
 The first permit for the erection of a summer home on the Manzano national forest has been issued to Mrs. J. H. O'Reilly, who will shortly build a summer cottage in one of the attractive canyons of the Sandia mountains. The service has followed the policy of giving permits for buildings of this character for some time, but this is the first time that the local forest has been made the scene of anything of the kind.  
 For a small consideration, the service rents the ground for such home-steads, and provides fire protection when the occupants are absent, to all persons desiring to build homes on the forests. The land is not sold, but is practically perpetually leased.
