**REST, FOOD AND GOOD AIR SAYS DR. SMART**

Local Bacteriologist Tells People How to Recover From Tuberculosis in Address at Central School.

At a well attended meeting at the Central School building last night, Dr. Robert Smart, a local bacteriologist and physician, told people suffering from tuberculosis the three essentials of recovery from the dread disease. The meeting was held for the purpose of interesting people in the crusade against tuberculosis which is about to be organized here, and was addressed by Rev. H. B. Tolbert in addition to Dr. Smart. Dr. Tolbert made a strong address, a feature of which was that tubercular persons should feel the desire of the community to help them, and not to think they were considered as a race apart, a plague on the city. Dr. Tolbert urged a campaign of education among the people affected with the plague, saying he believed this would do great good.

Dr. Smart spoke of the measures which should be used to combat the infection of others with the trouble, and laid down the following three rules to health for tubercular sufferers:

"There are three cardinal rules which the consumptive must obey if he will get well, and these if taken in time will cure him, without the slightest recourse to medicine.  
 "Live twenty-four hours of the day in the open, out of doors.  
 "Eat three meals a day of good wholesome food, and between them take plenty of fresh milk and eggs.  
 "Take plenty of rest, and take exercise under the direction of some competent physician."

He also said: "All medicines given to tuberculars have a tendency to knock out the stomach and in the fight against this disease the stomach is the one organ that we have most to depend upon. It is the grate of the furnace that produces the steam for the heating, when you burn out the grate your heating plant is in bad repair; so with the stomach, if the stomach is knocked out by medicine and unable to assimilate the foods put into it the rest of the body must suffer in consequence."  
 "Therefore, leave medicines alone. When they are necessary they should be given by one knowing their power both for good and for evil."

**ARIZONIANS WILL ARRIVE HERE TONIGHT**

Team From University of Sister State is in El Paso This Morning, and Will Get Here Early in Evening.

A delegation of the students from the state university has been arranged for to meet the team from the University of Arizona when that aggregation completes its long trip and arrives here from El Paso tonight. The boys left Tucson yesterday morning, and will be grateful for a night's quiet rest before the game.

What tomorrow's game will be like, no one can say. It will be a good game that much is sure, but who will win is a matter of great conjecture. The Varsity team is far lighter than the husky men from Arizona, but are fast and play a game that abounds in the unexpected—for the other fellow.

The Varsity team weighs a little less than 140 pounds to the man. The Arizonians weigh an average of 150 pounds. One thing that will be of advantage to the Varsity is the higher altitude here. Properly utilized this should be a great aid in playing faster than the Arizona eleven.

Sportsmanship in the finest sense of the word is shown by the Arizonians in putting up the Bryant trophy this year, after the Varsity had practically forfeited it last year by its failure to compete. Each team had actually won the trophy once and last year's game should have decided its ownership forever. But the game was not played and with true sporting blood the Arizona boys have put it up again this year, that an actual contest may settle its title for good and all.

Hunter is back in the game, playing a short time in practice yesterday. His hand will be protected in the game by a heavy leather shield, so that no damage will accrue to the injured member in the scrimmages. With Hunter back in the game at his old place at guard the line will be materially strengthened. The ticket sales have been very encouraging, and when the receipts are counted after the game tomorrow, it is thought that the big \$700 guarantee made the Arizona team will be well covered by the total. Seats have been provided and wired off from the field, and all spectators will be required to either keep in the stands or else stand on the ground on the other side of the field for positively no one will be allowed inside the lines.

A dance will be held tomorrow night in honor of the boys from Arizona and every effort to give them the best possible impression of Albuquerque and Albuquerque hospitality will be made. It has been three years since Arizona sent a team to this city, and the Varsity wants the Arizona crowd to feel the progress their institution has made.
