

**DEADLY TOLL IN
MINE DISASTER
REMAINS AT 7;
13 ARE INJURED**
Mass Funeral For the Men
Killed at Madrid Last
Saturday Afternoon Will
Be Held This Afternoon

**CAUSE OF EXPLOSION
IS NOT DETERMINED**
One of the Victims Had Ar-
ranged to Bring His Wife
and Children From Ireland
Early Next Spring

Madrid, N. M., Nov. 26.—Bodies of the seven miners, killed when gas ignited in the Albuquerque and Cerrillos mine here Saturday afternoon, are to be buried here Monday afternoon at a mass funeral. Five of the dead miners were recovered from their 4000 feet deep tomb Saturday, and the two others were recovered Sunday, following an all night working of rescue crews Saturday night.

The dead are:
ALEX BROWN, foreman, aged 35; survived by a widow and two children now in Belfast, Ireland.
ROBERT BARRICK, aged 44; survived by a widow and four children.
FLORENCIA MARTINI, aged 45; survived by a widow and four children.
GEORGE ALEXANDER, aged 28; survived by a widow and two children.
GIL GREGIO, 20; survived by a widow and one child.
JACK O'RY, aged 25; single.
ANDREW KLASS, aged 52; widower.

Families of all of the dead, with the exception of Brown, lived in the mining camp of Madrid, Brown, who is a native Scotchman, had been in America for a couple of years, working to save enough money to bring over his family, last week he made final arrangements for the arrival of his wife and children from Ireland in the early spring.

WOMAN ENDS OWN LIFE
Los Angeles, Nov. 26.—The body of Miss Margertha Linn, 55, formerly of Chicago, was found in her home here today by friends who became alarmed at her absence since last Tuesday and commenced a search. The police report that Miss Linn is said to be wealthy, committed suicide by taking poison.

**DEBTS IS GIVEN
AN OVATION BY
CHICAGO CROWD**
Leader of the Socialist Party
Makes His First Public
Speech Since His Release
From Prison

Chicago, Nov. 26.—(By the Associated Press)—Eugene V. Debs, leader of the socialist party, made his first public speech since leaving Atlantic penitentiary here today and was given an ovation that delayed the start of his address for more than an hour.

Hundreds stood outside the hall for hours after five guards had limited the audience to 4,000 people. Jean Longuet, French socialist in whose honor the meeting was held, was overshadowed by the demonstration accorded Debs.
