PROMPT ACTION TO PUNISH ARKANSAS MINE RIOTERS

Warrants Charging Murder, Arson and Rioting Being Prepared Today at Fort Smith for Men Who Wrecked Prairie Creek.

Greenwood, Ark., July 20.—Warrants charging murder, arson and rioting were prepared here today at the instance of Prosecuting Attorney Little for the arrest of a number of persons, who it is declared, participated in the attack last week on the Prairie Creek mines of the Bache-Denham coal company, while the company's miners were on strike.

Crucify Treaty Signed.

Washington, July 20.—Secretary Bryan and Minister Maria de Pena today signed a treaty binding the United States and Uruguay to investigate for at least a year through an international commission of five members all differences which cannot be settled by diplomacy. It is the eighteenth of such peace treaties.

BIG LEAGUE BALL PLAYERS MAY GO ON STRIKE

Players' Fraternity Sends Ultimatum to Club Owners in Case of Player Kraft. Johnson Says Owners will Fight

MAY RESULT IN FINISH OF THE SEASON'S GAME

New York, July 20.—Drastic action, possibly a strike or walkout of baseball players in the American and National leagues is contemplated by the baseball players' fraternity, according to a statement by President Fultz, in case the National commission refuses to accede to the terms of an ultimatum sent it by the fraternity in the case of Player Kraft of the Newark International.

P. N. Johnson, president of the American league, has called a meeting here tomorrow of all the American club owners. Mr. Johnson said this afternoon that if a strike order is obeyed by the players every American league ball park will close its gates, all players' salaries will be stopped and the striking players will be punished for their action.

"The American league is ready to meet this issue with a solid front," declared Mr. Johnson. "Our club owners are armed for war. It's about time this fraternity nonsense should end. We have been very patient with Mr. Fultz and his associates, but they have gone too far and we intend to call their bluff."

"You can say for me if the American league players or a majority of them obey a strike order on Wednesday every American league club will close its gates, all salaries will be stopped and we will inflict heavy fines on the players who thereby violate the letter and spirit of their contracts."

"You can also say that this strike will be the last one conducted by Mr. Fultz and his fraternity for we are prepared to keep our grounds closed for the rest of the season, no matter what it may cost us."

"Kraft belongs to the Nashville club and that club has a just claim on him. There is no way out of the present tangle unless a major league club buys Kraft from Nashville. I understand that President Furrill of the New York Americans is ready to buy Kraft but personally I hope he does not close the deal until after Wednesday so that the American league can call the fraternity's bluff."

David L. Fultz, president of the fraternity, said: "I hope that the trouble may be settled amicably."

METZINGER SETS NEW MILE MARK WITH MOTORCYCLE

William Metzinger lowered his own record for a mile at Traction park yesterday with a twin-cylinder motorcycle, cutting the mark from 1:12 1/2 to 1:01 1/2. The races were attended by 500. The gate receipts were divided into stakes.

Ed Swope won four events—the three-mile for single-cylinder machines; three-mile for single-cylinder with Smith, and a handicap match race with Metzinger, the latter on a twin-cylinder machine. Metzinger won a three-mile twin-cylinder race and a four-mile race. He broke the record in the latter event.

BRIGHT WEATHER MARKS OPENING OF THE GRAND CIRCUIT

Cleveland, O., July 20.—The weather is all that could be desired for the opening of the grand circuit for the 1914 season at the North Randall track today. There are 18 horses ready to start, one of the largest fields that ever faced the starter in a grand circuit stake. Nine horses will be scored ahead, making an even two tiers.

ANOTHER SUPPOSED WINTERS CHILD WRONG ONE

Body Believed to be that of New Castle Indiana Doctor's Daughter Identified by Urbana Man.

Chicago, July 20.—Another supposed solution to the mysterious disappearance of Catherine Winters, 9-year-old daughter of Dr. William A. Winters, of New Castle, Ind., apparently failed today when a body exhumed yesterday in the potter's field at Urbana, Ill., was identified by Nicholas Laarp as that of his child. Detectives had declared the corpse was that of the missing Winters girl who disappeared from home in March, 1913. Dr. Winters, at New Castle, after receiving a description of the body, declared it could not be his daughter as her hair was brown, while that of the girl taken from the grave was light blonde.

Guy Stewart, an undertaker, said Larry was the man who had the child placed in the vault. The corpse lay in the vault for a year and then was buried in the potter's field because no one claimed it.

Larry saw the body today and said it was that of his daughter. She was two years old, he said, and died in Jacksonville, Fla.

The detectives had claimed they traced the body from New Castle to Florida and thence to Urbana.
