**GENERAL FIGHTING BUT
 NOTHING DECISIVE**

Berlin, Sept. 29, via London, Sept. 29 (11:41 a. m.)—A report given out at army headquarters today says:

"There has been general fighting on one front in France, but nothing decisive. The center is quiet. The French advances in the vicinity of Verdun and Toul have been renewed."

**DEFEAT OF THE AUSTRIAN
 ARMY NOW COMPLETE**

London, Sept. 29 (5:54 p. m.)—In a dispatch from Rome, the correspondent of the Central News says the Russian ambassador announces that an Austrian army, fleeing before the Russians, has been surrounded near Bockau and that its defeat is complete. All the food, ammunition and war material which was being conveyed back to Austria has fallen into Russian hands. The captures include 500 military automobiles.

**BELGIANS REPORT SHELLS
 BURSTING IN HOSPITALS**

London, Sept. 29 (5:42 p. m.)—In a dispatch from Antwerp the correspondent of Reuters' Telegram company says four wounded men and two women were killed by a shell which pierced the roof of a hospital at Lierre yesterday during the German bombardment. The ward in which the wounded men lay was completely wrecked.

**GERMANS ALLEGED DESTRUCTION
 OF HOSPITAL BY FIREFIERS**

London, Sept. 29 (5:21 p. m.)—The correspondent of Reuters' Telegram company at Amsterdam says that a dispatch has been received there from Berlin stating the German general staff announces that the surgeon general of the army has sent the following telegram to Emperor William:

"A few days ago a military hospital at Ocheson (France) was attacked by franc-tireurs (irregular sharpshooters).

"An expedition sent out to Ocheson on September 24, composed of one battalion of the landwehr, encountered a superior hostile force. The Germans were obliged to retreat, losing 25 dead and 35 wounded. The next day Bavarian troops were sent out but found no enemy at Ocheson. The inhabitants had fled the town, which has now been destroyed by the Germans."

**RED CROSS WILL REACH
 PAULLAC TOMORROW**

Washington, Sept. 29.—Rear Admiral Ward, commanding the American hospital ship Red Cross, reported today he would reach Paullac (Belgium) and Rotterdam October 4.

Dr. Edward W. Ryan, director of the Red Cross hospital unit sent on the Greek ship September 9 to Nish, Serbia, has reported by cable from Palermo that he will reach Piranesi October 2.

**OPERATORS
 REFUSE TO
 END THE
 STRIKE**

Head of Colorado Fuel and Iron Definitely Announces Rejection of President's Plan for Peace.

ALLEGES CONDITIONS UNFAIR TO MINE OWNERS

President Wilson, Insisting on a Settlement, Indicates Federal Troops Can No Longer Be Employed in Strike Zone.

Denver, Col., Sept. 29.—J. F. Welborn, president of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, upon his return from a conference with President Wilson regarding the proposed peace in the Colorado coal miners' strike, issued a statement today in which he reiterated that the proposal contained conditions which the company could not accept.

Mr. Welborn's statement follows: "The president received me very courteously and manifested an interest in what I had to say about the strike, as well as general conditions connected with the coal industry in Colorado. He said that much I told him was new, and he offered no criticism on our conduct of the strike, yet stated that at this time he preferred to consider the proposal presented by him rather than any thing that the coal operators might have to offer.

"There are many insuperable conditions in the peace proposal which appeal to fair-minded men when made clear. The requirement that the operators re-employ 'all striking miners who have not been found guilty of violation of the law' when to do so would make necessary the discharge of some faithful employees, would involve placing at work alongside of those who have been loyal and peacefully inclined, others who have repeatedly threatened and abused them. At practically every camp our employees are protesting in large numbers against the re-employment of strikers except such as are known to have participated in abuse of violence. The frequency and character of these protests convinces us that the acceptance and carrying out of the proposal in good faith would cause more men to leave our service than could be employed from among those on strike, and the result therefore would be a reduction rather than an increase in coal output."

**SENATOR THOMAS SAYS
 OPERATORS WILL REFUSE**

Washington, Sept. 29.—Senator Thomas, who has just returned from conferences with Colorado operators and striking miners, told President Wilson today he believed the plan of settlement, already accepted by the miners but rejected in part by the operators would have to be materially modified before the latter would agree to it. The president does not intend to keep federal troops in the Colorado fields indefinitely and is pressing for a speedy adjustment.

**BACK FROM 5,000
 MILE AUTOMOBILE
 JOURNEY**

**J. C. Peterson, Salesman for

 Big Motor Factories.**

J. C. Peterson, assistant salesman for the Quickel Auto and Supply company, returned home last night from an automobile tour of 5,210 miles, of which he started from Albuquerque August 12th. Mr. Peterson was accompanied by his wife and they made the trip in a 1913 Ford car, with an upkeep expense of a new set of tires and \$125 for parts. The car, which had a specially built body for the trip, was decorated with state flags and pennants, which Mr. Peterson said attracted attention everywhere.

Mr. Peterson went east especially to visit the Ford factory at Detroit and to see how an automobile is made. He visited all of the big motor manufacturing plants of Michigan and the other lake states, visited three weeks with relatives in Indiana, and returned home via St. Louis, Kansas City and Amarillo, Texas, without a mishap more pertinent than a blow-out. Every minute of the 5,000 mile journey, he said, proved enjoyable.

**MURDERER ESCAPES
 FROM A STATE
 ROAD CAMP**

Harry Eaton Faces 40 Years' Imprisonment If Recaptured; \$50 Reward Offered for His Taking.

Harry Eaton, a convicted murderer sentenced to serve from twenty to forty years, is at large. He escaped from the state road camp near San Marcel yesterday. Word of the escape was sent to the local police, together with an offer of \$50 reward for his capture.

Eaton was sentenced from Grant county last October. He is 29 years old, weighs 125 pounds, is five feet eleven inches tall, has dark hair and gray eyes. Although the notice does not say so, as a murderer facing forty years imprisonment if recaptured, he will probably prove a bad man to handle if run down.

**REDLIGHT LID GOES
 ON WITH A SLAM
 TOMORROW**

Chief McMillin Prepares to Enforce the Anti-Vice Law Recently Passed to the Letter.

**GIRLS ORDERED TO
 LEAVE ALBUQUERQUE**

Today marks the end of protected vice in this city. The ordinance passed by city council against the red-light district goes into effect tomorrow.

Immediately after the passage of the ordinance Chief of Police Thomas McMillin served emphatic notice on the keepers of the resorts and the women of the half-world that the traffic must cease on October 1, and his plans are all made to see that the ordinance, spirit and letter, is carried out.

There are about 20 of the so-called sisterhood in the city at this time. In the tenderloin district there are two houses of ill-fame and about 4 of what in common parlance are termed "cribs" are occupied.

All the girls of the redlight have been ordered out of town. The proprietors of the two houses cannot be driven out, because they own the property in which they live, and can refuse to leave as long as they remain within the law. All the girls, Chief McMillin said today, would leave town, should any of them attempt to remain on their promise to go by tomorrow, they will be arrested on sight. It is said that all the girls in one of the two leading resorts have arranged to get up headquarters in an Old Albuquerque resort.

Tomorrow Chief McMillin will make an inspection of the tenderloin to see that the lid has been properly placed.

The chief announced today that if necessary he will put a man on duty constantly to see that the anti-vice ordinance is obeyed.

outside the bounds, at least, they will run into what is said to be the most drastic and sweeping anti-vice ordinance it is possible to enforce under the constitution of the United States. Here it is:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful within the limits of the city of Albuquerque, New Mexico, for any woman to pursue or advertise in any manner her vocation as a prostitute, or to be guilty of prostitution.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful within the limits of the city of Albuquerque, New Mexico, for any person to keep a bawdy house, disorderly house, house of ill fame, resorted to for the purpose of prostitution or lewdness, or assignation house.

Sec. 3. It shall be unlawful for any person within the limits of said city, to visit or frequent any such bawdy house, disorderly house, house of ill fame or assignation in the night time or at any other time for the purpose of prostitution, or for the purpose of indulging in any indecent practice therein.

Sec. 4. In order to convict any person for the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, the character of such house or place may be established by proof that the same is generally reputed to be a bawdy house, house of ill fame, assignation

house or place for the practice of fornication.

Sec. 5. That any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in a sum not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars nor more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail or city prison not exceeding sixty (60) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

 KNIFE IS FINED \$15**

Frank Feller, who flourished a knife in a South Second street saloon yesterday afternoon until Officer Ed Donahue arrived and squelched him, was sentenced in a fine of \$15 or 15 days by Police Judge George R. Craig this morning. Witnesses testified that Feller made his knife play without provocation. He was drunk, it was testified, and drew his knife, although no one had said a word to him.
