the Long Island railroad, but it was a matter where I really had to act according to the advice of the commission, unless it could be shown that they were in the wrong.

On May 15, 1900, Senator Platt sent to Colonel Roosevelt a letter which he had received from Lemuel E. Quigg. The Quigg letter read in part:

"I have been thinking over your statement that Governor Roosevelt said you that the president had suggested to him that he go on the committee on resolutions at Philadelphia. I repeat what I said to you that I am quite willing to stand aside for the governor. But the more I think of it the more I am convinced that he ought not to take the responsibility of serving on this committee, as New York's representative. There will be several troublesome problems before the committee on resolutions and there is no reason why our candidate for governor should be personally responsible in the campaign for the precise language of the platform. Whatever the platform says, if Roosevelt is on the committee as New York's representative, every Democratic newspaper in the state will be demanding to know why this was not done and why that was done."

In a letter dated three days later Colonel Roosevelt returned Mr. Quigg's letter to Senator Platt, writing "the thing has gone so far that I could not get out of being a part of it. Do you really regard it as important for me to come? Can't Woodruff take my place? Does president really expect me?"

One December 6, 1900, Colonel Roosevelt telegraphed to the senator this: "Am greatly concerned because charter commission has arranged lunch for myself and Odell next Wednesday, this being the only day they could get out of being a part of it. Do you really regard it as important for me to come? Can't Woodruff take my place? Does president really expect me?"

Senator Platt in reply telegraphed Colonel Roosevelt: "Think your absence from meeting of commission will be deplored by the president and other governors. Meeting of charter commission seems to me should be secondary. Let them postpone."

Then Colonel Roosevelt telegraphed: "All right, in view of your second telegram, I will come; but you are not an easy boss."

Experiment With Hertzian Waves. London, April 27.—Experiments with Hertzian waves are being followed very closely by "Trinity House," in the belief that the system will prove more valuable than coast lights. Some experts are even looking forward to the gradual extinction of the latter.

The wireless signals can be employed in foggy weather when light-houses cannot be seen and several vessels are now fitted with what are known as direction finders.

On the north coast of France the French government has been experimenting with special stations, the signals being emitted at regular intervals. If a vessel is fitted with a radio compass it is easy to apply the information, but even without one the receipt of any signal at all is an advantage, for the exact positions of the stations are known.

Hypnotism For Wounded. London, April 27.—Hypnotism is being tried with some good results in the treatment of soldiers who have broken down under the shock and strain of the battlefield.

The patient is seated in a chair and is brought under hypnotism in the ordinary way. He is told to clear his mind of all other thoughts and to concentrate on the single subject of his cure. If, as often happens, his vision is affected by "shell shock" he is told quietly and firmly that the defect has been cured and that he can once again see clearly. In some cases a single sitting is enough, in others the treatment is repeated many times.

Le Chateau was repaired.
In the Meuse hills, we also secured further advantages yesterday. Although the French brought up new forces the attacks made by the enemy against our positions at Combreux failed.

A fierce attack in the forest of Ailly was repulsed by us with heavy losses to the enemy. Further east in this district the enemy gained no new ground.

In nocturnal hand-to-hand fighting we also worked our way successfully in Le Perre wood.

The enemy repeatedly commenced attacks last night against our positions on Hartmanns-Wellerkopf. All these attacks failed.

In the eastern theater of the war the situation remains unchanged.

GERMAN AFFAIRS REVEALED. London, April 24 (11:42 a. m.).—The following Belgian official report on the progress of hostilities, dated April 25, was given out in London today:

Last night our infantry repelled three attacks made south of Dixmude by the Germans, who again are using asphyxiating gases. The Germans sustained heavy losses.

Twenty thousand victims in two days. Geneva, Switzerland, April 27.—(via Paris, 12:50 p. m.)—The Russian have begun another strong offensive movement around the heights of Isack pass, in the Carpathian mountains, according to a telegram received by the Tribune of Geneva.

The Austro-German casualties there in the last two days, the dispatch says, number 26,000 men.

that we consolidated our positions and continue to make progress to the north of Ypres and also on the heights of the Meuse.

"The summit of Hartmanns-Wellerkopf, which was taken from us yesterday morning, was recaptured by our troops the evening of the same day. We also took some prisoners."

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
