**TO HOLD EXERCISES AT THE SITE OF "Y" BUILDING**

**Speechmaking and Music to Mark Turning of the First Shovelful of Dirt Saturday; McQuade Is Contractor.**

Judge Neil B. Field will be the chief speaker at the exercises to be held Saturday afternoon to mark the breaking of ground for the Y. M. C. A. building.  
 Plans for the event are rapidly shaping. Rev. Dr. Edward P. Schaefer, chaplain of the booster army of this city, some leader of the Y. M. C. A. union, is composing a song especially for the occasion. It will be sung by a chorus of 1,000 voices. Copies of it will be distributed through the crowd and everybody will be expected to join in the music.  
 There will be a triumphal march to the site of the building. The Commercial club will be the gathering place for the crowd, and from the club they will parade through town to the site at First street and Central avenue. There they will be met and welcomed with loud music by the Indian school band.

Work will be started on the proposed Y. M. C. A. building Saturday afternoon. The hour of beginning is fixed in the afternoon because the turning of the first shovelful of dirt is to be made a civic event with a big program of speechmaking and music.  
 The contract for the construction of the building was let by the association directors last night at a meeting in the Commercial club. J. W. McQuade was awarded the big job. He will get \$57,000 for it. His bid was the lowest of four submitted. The others ranged up to \$60,000.

The contract as it stands now was the result of three weeks of careful deliberation on the part of the board of directors. The original contracts were rejected because they ranged from \$72,000 to \$75,000—figures out of the question because of the money available—and the directors set out to work over the specifications so that a building essentially as good as the one first called for, but coming within the association's means, might be obtained.

They solved the problem without sacrificing or eliminating a thing that will detract from the exterior appearance of the building or the convenience and equipment of the interior. The cost was reduced by the "absorption" of details in such a way as to effect the saving sought without in any way changing the general design. The building will be as big and fine as at first proposed.

The exercises Saturday afternoon at First street and Central avenue will begin at 4 o'clock. A platform to be erected for the speakers. The Indian school band will furnish the music.  
 Every man, woman and child in the city is asked to gather at the site and join in the celebration of the event. Business houses are asked to give their employees an hour off so that they may join in the meeting.  
 The contractor's agreement calls for the completion of the building by Christmas. It is expected that the structure will be turned over formally to the association by December 25. On Christmas day it is planned to hold exercises dedicating the structure.

Arrangements for Saturday's exercises are in the hands of a committee composed of Robert E. Putney, John Mills, C. G. Cushman, George A. Kaseaman and W. A. George.  
 The three holders who hold Mr. McQuade submitted figures on the contract are: Thomas W. Nelson of Chicago, Layden & Orntstein of the city, and Linn and Axell of this city. The two Chicago firms have been given contracts for part of the work on the new Santa Fe shops. Layden & Orntstein have recently completed the big concrete store house.
