CONWAY WILL BRING 200 DELEGATES TO TEACHERS' CONVENTION

Santa Fe County Superintendent Here Today to Engage Quarters for Big Party of Educators.

THIRTY-FIVE SCHOOL DIRECTORS COMING

Santa Fe County Has Honor of Being First County in State to Enroll Every Teacher in Association.

"Santa Fe county is the first county in the state to enroll every one of its public school teachers in the membership of the New Mexico Educational Association," said John Vincent Conway, Santa Fe county superintendent of schools, who arrived in Albuquerque this morning to engage quarters for a delegation of close to 200 people from Santa Fe and the county schools, for the coming teachers' convention.

"Furthermore," continued Mr. Conway, "we are going to have the largest delegation in attendance at the convention of any county in the state, unless my count is all wrong. In addition to our teachers, all of whom will attend, there will be not less than thirty-five school directors, and when you add to these the considerable number of men and women indirectly interested, who expect to accompany our teachers, the Santa Fe county delegation will be at least 200. The State Educational association has the most cordial support and backing by Santa Fe county. Our teachers and school directors believe in it as one of the great educational forces of the state and regard attendance as essential."

Mr. Conway will meet Mrs. Conway here this afternoon. The latter has been in California for several months visiting relatives and the expositions. He expects to return to Albuquerque Saturday and complete arrangements for his delegation to the convention, Saturday night. Mr. Conway will go to El Paso where he will meet representatives of the Carranza government who have invited him to undertake the organization of educational work in northern Mexico. The offer is an important one and Mr. Conway proposes to make a careful investigation.

NEW MEXICO NEEDS AWAKENING WITH REGARD TO GAME PROTECTION

State Is Delinquent in Forwarding Cards to Dr. Hornaday in Support of Conservation Plan.

PERMANENT SUPPLY OF FOOD ANIMALS POSSIBLE

Forest Service, Biological Survey Agree on Basis of Action to Insure Good Hunting.

In a bulletin given out today Acting District Forester E. N. Kavanaugh called attention to mailing cards which citizens are asked to send to Dr. W. T. Hornaday if they favor the game protection plan which has been drawn up in the belief that it would insure a permanent supply of game for food in the national forests of New Mexico and all the other national forests of the country. In connection with Dr. Hornaday's visit here last month cards were distributed for the citizens' consideration. According to a letter just received from the famous naturalist New Mexico so far has been delinquent in forwarding cards.

Much Forest Land Gameless.

Millions of acres of national forests now are utterly destitute of game worthy of mention. Over thousands of square miles in the west and the east you now can hunt until drowsy without finding a four-footed animal worth shooting as food. Vast opportunities to create a great annual supply of big game are being wasted by lack of intelligent and resolute action.

The Hornaday plan proposes an enormous increase in game that may legitimately be killed for food purposes. This can be secured without loss to any other industrial interests. All that is needed is a safe and sane law, honestly enforced, and a little patience in waiting for results.

The following basis of game protection has been agreed upon, informally, by the officers of the forest service, the national biological survey and Dr. Hornaday, for brevity and convenience it is at present called "The Hornaday Plan."

1. A federal law empowering the secretary of agriculture to select and define areas in national forests suitable for game sanctuaries.

2. These sanctuaries shall be established by presidential proclamation.

3. These sanctuaries shall be so located that they will not occupy lands chiefly suitable for agriculture.

4. These sanctuaries shall be located where they will interfere with the least extent practicable with the grazing of domestic stock, especially the stock of actual settlers.

5. These sanctuaries shall be established with the approval of the governor of each state concerned.

6. It is expedient to establish a large number of sanctuaries of medium size rather than a few large preserves.

7. The ideal condition would be a chain of sanctuaries which in time would restore game to all the intervening territory.

8. Administration will be vested in the secretary of agriculture.

9. Sanctuaries are to be settled after full consideration of all conditions.

10. Predatory animals are to be killed.

11. The object of these sanctuaries is to provide breeding places for game which will spread over adjacent territory, where it will be subject to the regular open season provided by law.

This will prevent danger of overstocking the ranges. It will therefore not be the general policy to extend these sanctuaries.

In addition to the above, it is to be understood that the final success of the plan contemplates the same strict regulation of the game that may and may not be killed annually, the same as obtains in the deer forests of Europe.

A large stock of game must be kept alive so that the annual increase will yield a large food supply that will be permanent.

The forest office here has sent out an additional supply of cards and for the experiments have been requested to place them in the hands of reputable people with the suggestion that they forward them to Dr. Hornaday at once if they approve of the plan. Local people in favor of the plan may get cards of Supervisor James E. McNichol of the Mountain forest, whose office is in the federal building.
