MEXICANS SAY MOVE SOUTH MEANS WAR U. S. Troops Not to March Toward Border, Is Notice

The Evening Herald (Special Wire) Washington, June 17.—War Department officials here today received word from General Pershing that he had received a message from General Trevino, commander of the Third cavalry, that any movement of American troops toward the border would be regarded as hostile and that he would not recognize the authority of the American expedition.

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PERSHING INTIMATES TREVINO KNOWS WHERE TO GO AT ONCE

San Antonio, Texas, June 17.—General Pershing has told General Jacinto Trevino, in reply to the message warning him that any move of the American troops, except toward the border would be regarded as hostile and that he would not recognize his authority to govern the movements of the American expedition.

AMERICAN TROOPS CROSS THE BORDER AND BEGIN A BATTLE

San Antonio, Texas, June 17.—American troops crossed the border below Brownsville this afternoon and immediately were engaged in fighting, according to a report from General Pershing to General Funston.

VIGILANCE PREVENTS THE ISLETAS RAID

Twenty-five or Thirty Americans Fired on by Mexicans Who Cross River and Kidnap a Texas Farmer.

The Evening Herald (Special Wire) San Antonio, Tex., June 17.—It was reported today that twenty-five or thirty Americans were fired on by Mexicans who crossed the Rio Grande and kidnaped a Texas farmer. The Americans were on vigilance and prevented a raid on the Isletas.

Officers and soldiers of the American garrison here were kept closely to their quarters. Street car service to Juarez was at a standstill.

Tension was noticeable on the Mexican side where numbers of civilians were arming themselves.

Reports from authentic sources indicated that recruiting for the army was being pushed in all the larger cities in northern Mexico. There was no indication of inward developments in this vicinity during the night.

It was positively reported that they had been ordered to be ready to cross into Mexico at a moment's notice.

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
