CHARGES ARE FILED AGAINST LAW FIRM BY INVESTIGATORS

Committee Appointed Under Direction of Supreme Court Formulates Accusations Involving Marron and Wood

The report of the committee charged with investigating accusations of misconduct against the law firm of Marron & Wood was filed in the supreme court yesterday.

There are eight sections to the report. Two of them refer to Mr. Wood, three to Mr. Marron and three to both Mr. Marron and Mr. Wood.

Sections of the report touching on the Chadwick and Meyers cases contain accusations against Mr. Wood. Sections referring to the Ayer and Edgar cases and one mentioning the Garcia case carry accusations against Mr. Marron. Two sections referring to the Garcia case contain charges against both attorneys, and a charge against both is included in a section touching on the Johnson case with the Garcia and Meyers cases, with which the newspaper reading public are familiar. Charging Mr. Wood with growing out of the Garcia case was finished recently by the present court and Judge Reynolds concluded a hearing on the charge of desert in the Meyers case this week.

One charge has to do with the alleged attempt to collect a fee from the plaintiff in the Edgar divorce case after the defendant had paid him a full settlement of the fee. Another charge is the effect that in the Ayer case the client received but \$100 as her share of a settlement in the sum of \$1,750, although there was an alleged agreement that there be an equal division of the proceeds of the case.

In connection with the Johnson case it is charged that a judgment for \$2,000 was obtained with the express understanding that Judge Reynolds should set aside the judgment if it was obtained for the purpose of compelling the client to pay to some other court and that while Judge Reynolds was temporarily out of town, Judge Miller was asked to enter the motion to dismiss the judgment, and an effort was made to resist the motion without regard to the understanding entered into when the default judgment was obtained. In doing which it is alleged attempt was made to deceive and mislead Judge Miller and to deprive him of his fee and to obstruct the proceedings of the court.
