# VAN LOAN DESCRIBES A WONDER-FILM SOON TO RECEIVE RELEASE

### Ten-reel Picture, Two Years in Making, Abounds With Spectacular and Unique Scenes Under the Sea.

H. H. Van Loan, publicity manager for the Universal film manufacturing company, sprang a good one last night when he gave some advance information about a new picture the Universal soon will release. The film, a ten-reel feature, is strictly an adventure story but abounds in scenes of the spectacular order, to put it very mildly, indeed.

There are dozens of scenes in this film taken beneath the surface of the ocean—just Van Loan has the "title" to prove it. The scenes are of all sorts, except uninteresting, and were taken through the agency of the Williamson Dive, a device for underwater exploration at depths practically unheard-of before its invention. It was developed for the examination of deep sea life, wrecks and other matters which an ordinary diver cannot reach. The Universal people already have used it for making a two-reel education picture of undersea life, but until last December it was busy, had been for several months, in fact, in the Bahamas islands, where the picture already mentioned was being made.

In this picture the scenes were developed, one by one, and one by one, until the submarine itself after an explosion, fire, and burst in the air, to the peril of the account, and a submarine was built and used. Some scenes of the picture show divers, under the sea, fastening flares of explosive to the hull of this craft; the explosion, the sinking of the submarine and the subsequent escape of a diver, have been shot. Van Loan has a full idea of this last which gives a good idea of its length, which must have been all of 150 feet. A score of men on its deck occupy comparatively little space.

The George Silliman group of divers, who raised the submarine F-4 from her watery berth in Honolulu harbor last year, got into the picture spending nearly a day beneath the surface of the clear Bahama ocean, swimming against waves from the northeast. This is the first picture, so far as known, in which actual action under water at an extended length has been filmed. Of course, in "Nippon's" "Lighthouse" there were some under water scenes, but they were taken in a tank and were short. Those in the coming picture are long and were taken actually beneath the waves.

The company did considerable work at night, under water, lighting the scene with numerous giant calcium lights hung over the side of the yacht which was their headquarters until the time came for it to be blown up. This yacht was purchased, luckily, from a wealthy New Yorker who was organizing the southern seas when the company happened to need it, and who demanded almost a prohibitive price for it, which necessarily compelled the company to pay.

All the undersea portions of the picture, as well as some diving directly with the yacht and submarines, were taken in the Bahamas. In one scene 12,000 natives of the islands were utilized. Interior scenes were made last winter in New Jersey. The city scenes now are being made at Universal City, in California.

### RUSSIAN ATTACKS FAIL TO GAIN GROUND, SAYS BERLIN

Berlin, July 28 (Via Skywire and Wireless).—Attacks by two Russian army corps east of Grodno in the Lituanovitch region were delivered yesterday but failed to gain ground, the war office announced today. The battle is still in progress.

The Russians have resumed their attack southeast of Vladimir-Volynski in southern Volhynia and succeeded in penetrating general von Linsingen's lines northeast of Zolotykh, but are being vigorously counter-attacked by the Germans.

The German official statement follows: "Western theater: A German patrol in the district of Neuve Chapelle brought in two machine guns and thirty prisoners of whom three were officers.

"North of the Somme the English fire was increased to its greatest strength. In the afternoon strong attacks were launched near Posiettes and at Foreaux wood and to the

eastward of there. They broke down in front of German positions.

"At Longpré and in Belgium wood there was hard to hand fighting but there also the enemy failed to succeed.

"South of the Somme, the artillery duel continues severe, although there were only attacks of hostile hand grenade troops near Soyssart, which were repulsed.

"East of the Meuse, French enterprises against Tournai work failed.

"Eastern theater: Army group of Field Marshal von Hindenburg: The situation generally is unchanged.

"Army group of Prince Genovaldi of Isonzo: The Russians have renewed their attacks in this region. Since yesterday they have attacked six times in vain with two army corps on the front of the Scharoun and Vygodza to the east of Gorodische. Further attacks are in progress.

"The attacking force of two divisions ebbed back and fourth several times before our positions to the northwest of Luchovits. The losses of the enemy were the heavier.

"Army group of general Linsingen: Russian attacks southeast of Schemichy, at first paired ground. Counter attacks are in progress.

"Austria-Hungarian troops near Posiettes repulsed the Russians from their advanced positions.

"Balkan theater: Northwest and north of Videna there were minor engagements in the foreground of the Bulgarian positions. The losses of the enemy were considerable."

### RUSSIANS CLEAR GERMAN TRENCHES IN CHAMPAGNE

Paris, July 28.—Russians reconnoitering at Auberville, in the Champagne, says the French official statement issued this afternoon, penetrated the German trenches and cleared them with hand grenades. The Russians took some prisoners.

A German attempt to attack near Eshons, near Châlons, was arrested by the French infantry fire.

On the right bank of the Meuse in the Verdun region, German preparations to attack Thionville work were stopped by artillery fire.

### ITALIANS GAIN FURTHER GROUND IN DOLOMITES AREA

Rome, July 28 (Via London, 4:15 p. m.).—Additional ground has been gained by the Italians in the Dolomites region, the war office announced today. After hard fighting with the Austrian defenders of Monte Cassin, the Italians extended their positions. Austrian attacks in front of Italian positions in various sectors further to the west, were repulsed.

The statement says: "On the night of July 28 the enemy attacked in force our positions on Monte Solungo in the Poena valley and on Monte Zeno, Sella-Costanzo Plateau, but were repulsed with heavy losses.

"On Monte Colbricon we extended our positions during the night after heavy fighting."

### RUSSIAN TROOPS ADVANCE HUNDRED MILES IN WEEK

Petrograd, July 27.—Russian troops

covered a hundred miles in their advance on Erzingan within a week. The capture of that city means the virtual completion of the Russian occupation of Turkish Armenia and gives them the benefit of the extremely fertile valley and opens up easy means of communication through Trabzon for the western and southern Caucasian armies.

It is estimated that the Turks had between 25 and 30 divisions between the Black sea and Mush, approximately 250,000 men. Three months ago the Turks undertook a comprehensive campaign intended to recapture Erzerum and incidentally to draw troops from the Russian European theater. General Rudnik, the Russian commander in the Caucasus, succeeded, however, in holding the Turks in the Erzerum district while delivering an effective blow at them in the Mush district. In order to counter this thrusting from the south and a similar effort from the north, the Russians were obliged temporarily to abandon Marmakhatum, 15 miles west of Erzerum. The Russians now have captured Trabzon, Baidar and Camudkhanch and re-occupied Marmakhatum.

The Gallipoli advance of the Russians has caused the Germans to withdraw troops from the Balkans and Turks were sent there to replace them. The Russians, quick to see the advantage this afforded, started a six-week offensive toward Erzerum, only a rear guard battle preceded the capture of the town, the Turkish main forces having been beaten and forced to retreat toward Sivas.

Discussing the energetic preparations of the Russians for the continuance of the war, General Chauvot, minister of war, in an interview with the Hinesky Slovo, says:

"It is necessary to dispel the illusion that the war can end in the autumn. The breaking down of the enemy's forces has already begun—a fact as well known by the Germans as by the entire allies—but Germany's technique is so such that in spite of her economic weakening and the lowered morale of her troops, Germany still has the power to resist and we must look forward to a further struggle before the final victory."

## AMBASSADOR CABLES TEXT OF PROPOSALS ON EUROPEAN RELIEF

Exact Wording of English Proffer of Supervision of Foodstuffs in Occupied Territory Is Sent to Washington.

[By Evening Herald (Leased Wire)]  
London, July 28 (12:09 a. m.).—Walter Hines Page, the American ambassador, has cabled to the state department the text of a letter from the foreign office regarding the feeding of the civilian population of territory occupied by the Germans. The letter says:

"His majesty's government desires to be able, once for all, the whole duration of the war, to supply the population of territory in the situation of the enemy. Therefore, it makes the following final proposal:

"If the German and Austria-Hungarian governments will reserve wholly to the civil population of occupied territory the entire produce of the soil, and if they will admit to those territories neutrals selected by the president of the United States with full powers to control the distribution of food to the whole population and to transfer from one territory to another surplus stocks existing in one and lacking in the other, and if the president of the United States will undertake the selection of those agents, his majesty's government will give them every assistance and admit into such territories any imported food supplies necessary to supplement native stocks and afford the population a fair subsistence ration as long as it is satisfied that the enemies are scrupulously observing their part of the agreement.

"If this is refused or a reply delayed until the harvest in the occupied
