### MORE IMPROVEMENTS ON AT UNIVERSITY; BUILDERS ARE BUSY

Capacity of Dining Hall Doubled by Addition Recently Completed; New Cottages for Men Are Being Erected.

Hardly a day goes by nowadays without some note of improvement or progress at the University. The latest word is that the addition to the dining hall, which will double the capacity of that to the students—important adjunct, has been completed. More cottages are being built for the men students, for even with the building of an addition to the Sigma Chi fraternity house, to care for eight additional students, and the purchase of a house by the Alpha Delta fraternity, to provide accommodations for as many more, the prospects for increased enrollment, and consequently increased demand for accommodations at the dormitories, are such as to require additions to the dormitory facilities.  
Much improvement work is being done at the men's dormitory itself. The bath rooms, with their equipment of showers, are to be doubled in size and other conveniences are to be added.  
The entire heating system of the institution is to be made over, but this will not have to be completed by August 22, the date of opening, as will the other work. The pipe lines which carry steam from the central heating plant, all are to be taken up and new ones of increased size laid, the boilers cleaned and several minor matters disposed of.

A new gymnasium, for the exclusive use of women, is to be built at once. Plans for it have not yet been completed but will be done in a few days. Until now the men and women at the University have used the general gymnasium on alternate days, though each sex has had separate locker rooms and other appointments.
