New York, Aug. 22 (11:30 a. m.)—Trading strength followed fresh activity in midday with a further gain in steel and other industries. This was offset, however, by sudden weakness in motor issues, Standard Oil, and Wisconsin bond showing extreme volatility of four and six points.

The first hour's quotation aggregated almost 400,000 shares of which steel is at high price of 97 1/2, furnished about 25 per cent. Other strong gains included Bethlehem Steel, 12 1/2 points; Sears Roebuck Co., and 2 1/2 points for Industrial Alcohol, Celanese, Ford, Baldwin Locomotive, Maxwell, Crocker and Bull and Standard Oil.

Profit taking exerted its usual effect on the secondary market, where some of the leaders fell under yesterday's bear quotations, but steel held very strongly within a fraction of its peak. Heavy absorption of Anglo-French bonds is said to have been mostly in a slight advance feature of the market.

With United States Steel again leading at a new high record, today's market mounted higher levels with gains for in excess of 4,000,000 shares.

Stalls were fastidiously formed on the latter, their advance coinciding with more important action in Washington. The class was buoyant.

AS TO BULKHEADS AND LOADLINES, UNCLE SAM HAS BEEN A BIT REMISS

Washington, Aug. 22.—Secretary of Commerce Redfield has asked about forty of the leading American shipbuilders, presidents and general managers of principal American steamship companies, and best known naval architects, to meet at his office Wednesday, September 27, for an exchange of views on the subject of loadlines and bulkheads and on other phases of the construction of steamers on the coast and the Great Lakes as related to those two subjects.

The United States is almost alone among maritime nations in having no regulations governing loadlines. Our fleet of ocean-going vessels is growing so rapidly that this subject cannot longer be postponed, indeed already during the European war American ships have been seized from embarrassment and delays to commerce for lack of loadline regulations only by resort to temporary expedients.

The subject of bulkheads and hull construction was carefully considered at the London international conference on safety of life at sea and the American delegates had an important part in framing the chapters of the international convention on that subject. The United States has as yet taken no steps to give effect to these portions of the international convention. The subject is difficult and our failure as a shipbuilding and maritime nation is involved in a fight beginning along the lines indicated by the convention.

EASTERN TALENT TO PUT CALIFORNIA'S ELEVEN IN RUNNING

At Least, That Is What U. of C. Faithfully Hope; Impressive Array of Coaches from the Big Colleges Is Provided.

San Francisco, Aug. 21.—An impressive array of Eastern football coaching talent will be in view when the University of California football candidates make their initial appearance on the sidelines. The candidates are determined to get back into the American game as quickly as possible and ready to achieve this, no expense has been spared in employing the best available instructors.

Head Coach Andy Smith, of the University of Pennsylvania, will be in supreme command of the coaching staff. His assistants will be Tom Moran, the famous Harvard star and former Varsity, an all-American selection who played with Princeton. The average college would consider any one of these men as sufficient for California in under the necessity of unleashing Hoagy as well as learning the American game and when these two things are accomplished, the coaching staff will be reduced to normal.

September 1 is the date set for the first day of practice and present indications are that more than 250 men will report. Class games designed to develop material will be a feature of the season. According to the prospect, the varsity squad will be reduced to fifty men as soon as practicable. The remaining men will then be made up into class teams. A schedule of games will be made up and there will be regular competition. Men who are selected for the varsity squad will not be eligible for the class teams.

California will start the season with only three of its last season veterans missing. These men are Capt. Crawford, scumbers tackle and Hazlett, end.

With the advent of Mahan, who will have charge of the back field, it is expected that California will start in at once and practice its plays from kick formation which tend for an open game.

According to the California State Fish and Game Commission, the present hunting laws will permit of a steady increase of deer throughout the state provided these laws are observed and the animals are not slaughtered out of season. This increase will keep pace with the increase in population and the consequent growth in the number of hunters.

To insure this condition which will result in "good deer hunting" the commission asks the cooperation of the people. Some idea of the range over which these wild creatures roam is given in the following facts:

California has a thousand peaks over 10,000 feet high and 125 over 15,000 feet in height. There will remain 50,000,000 acres of government land, 20,000,000 acres in the National Forest Reserve, and 10,000,000 acres of private land. Campers are welcomed by the government employees as long as they observe the fish and game regulations. This immense area of tree hunting, fishing and camping grounds is largely augmented by the generosity of the farmers and range owners who will rarely object to the use in their favor of the properties of the state.

The great increase in deer is entirely due to the laws that first prohibit the sale of deer hide and meat, second, the killing of does, third, the hunt and short season, fourth the limit; fifth, the protection of "spike" traps. The protection of spike traps does not only help to increase the deer, but it compels the hunter to wait until he is sure that the animal is a deer with horns, thereby saving human life. When the law prohibited the killing of does, many hunters were killed by careless shooters. Now he must wait until he sees the horns.

The Olympic Club of San Francisco in the past has turned out some of the greatest title stars of the country, including such champions as James J. Corbett and James J. Braddock. It has the makings of another star destined to shine in the ring arena.

The new pugilist hope is Lawrence Fitzhugh. It is only two months ago that Professor George Green, boxing instructor at the club, first noted the manner in which Fitzhugh handled himself and watched him fight as impressed as the crowd that he took the pugilist athlete in tow and proceeded to show him something of the art of the game. Fitzhugh has proved an apt pupil and now Green says that in the not distant future his charges is quite likely to be a contender for heavyweight honors.

Fitzhugh stands six feet two inches in his stocking feet and weighs 200 pounds. Instead of being massive in structure he is lithe of build, which makes him a fast man, one of the fastest for his size, Green says, he has never seen in the ring. He is said to have a staggering punch in either hand and above all is a quick and intelligent thinker.

Fitzhugh is yet a mere novice at the game but he has been out up against some of the heaviest and toughest of the club's seasoned boxers and has twice then held his own in these trials. He is improving fast and, Green expects to have him sufficiently advanced to enter him in the next boxing show the club will stage at its gymnasium.
