## SANDOVAL CONTEST HEARING WILL BE STARTED ON FRIDAY

Small Armies of Witnesses Summoned in Clerkship Case for Examination Before Claude E. Hutto; Barth Firm Withdraws.

Special Examiner Claude E. Hutto will begin on Friday morning taking testimony here in the case of A. Montoya against Preciliano Ortiz, in which Montoya is contesting Ortiz's right to the office of county clerk of Sandoval county. Ortiz has a certificate of election and is holding the place.  
It is estimated that the contestant has more than fifty witnesses for examination and the defense will also have a large number.  
Barth & Mabry, who were retained by Ortiz, have withdrawn from the case out of propriety, since the same questions involved in this contest are involved in the Chirman contest against Senator Barth. This is the matter of some voters alleged to have voted out of their home precincts on certificates, in conformity to the old law which was repealed two years ago.  
Judge H. P. Barnes and A. A. Sedillo represent the contestant and Neil R. Field has been retained by Ortiz to argue the case before the court after testimony is completed.  
The little army of witnesses for the contestant began arriving in Bernallillo today, from all parts of Sandoval county.

## Kaiser, God and the Germans United; Will Fight to Bitter End

(By Evening Herald Special Wire) Amsterdam, Holland, Jan. 31 (Via London).—Emperor William, replying to a telegram received by him from the director of the province of Brandenburg, says a dispatch from Berlin, sent this message:  
"After thirty months of warfare, rich in sacrifices, the entire German people in holy wrath at the rejection of my peace offer, is inspired anew with doubled strength and stands as one man with the Kaiser and empire in order to victoriously pass through the blood of the final battle which now has become inevitable for house, home, honor and freedom and finally to place every peace stipulation within bounds. May God and our good sword help us thereto."

## Peace Undisturbed in Costa Rica; New Ministers Appointed

(By Evening Herald Special Wire) San Jose, Costa Rica, Jan. 31.—Peace remains undisturbed throughout the country, notwithstanding the deposition last Saturday of President Gonzalez. All banks have offered their full credit and support to the provisional government of Federico Tinoco, who was minister of war in the Gonzalez cabinet. The provisional president has appointed the following ministers:  
Foreign affairs, Carlos Lara; war and navy, J. J. Tinoco; public works, Juan B. Quiroz; finance, Oscar Holmness; interior, Amado Johanna; public instruction, H. Brenes Mesa.  
The provisional government today issued a decree for elections on April 1 for a congress which will meet on May 1 to draw up a new constitution.

## Mrs. Byrne Offered Conditional Pardon By Gov. Whitman

(Special Herald Special Bureau 44) Albany, N. Y., Jan. 31.—Governor Whitman today offered to pardon Mrs. Ethel Byrne, the New York birth control hunger striker, if she would agree not to break the law against disseminating birth control information in the future. His message will be communicated to Mrs. Byrne by a committee of women who appeared before the executive.  
The governor also promised the women that he would appoint a commission to investigate the entire subject of birth control propaganda with a view to amending the present laws if they were shown to work hardships.

## SANTA FE SPECIAL KILLS SUSPECT IN CAR ROBBERY CASE

Juan Antonio Pino Alleged to Have Threatened Party of Railway Police When Ordered to Halt Flight at Bosque.

Sheriff Rafael Garcia received a telephone message from the sheriff's office of Valencia county this afternoon asking for the arrest of V. L. Snyder, the Santa Fe special officer, who shot and killed Juan Pino at Bosque yesterday. Sheriff Garcia ordered Snyder's arrest. Valencia officials will be notified when he is taken into custody.

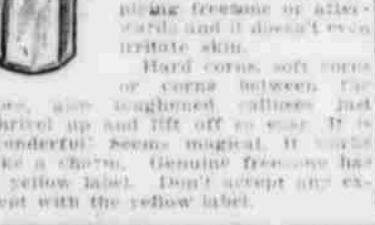
Juan Antonio Pino was killed by special officer V. L. Snyder, of the Santa Fe railway police force yesterday, at Bosque, Valencia county, seven miles south of Helen.  
Snyder was one of a party of Santa Fe policemen, headed by stunt Grant Hale, who went to Pino's house with a search warrant. Constable L. A. Delgado was with them.  
Pino is alleged to have tried to escape and it is asserted that when ordered to halt he turned with a revolver in his hand. Snyder fired one shot, the bullet striking Pino between the eyes.  
Pino is alleged to have been implicated in car robberies. A box containing alleged stolen goods is said to have been found buried in his yard.

Desired Legislation Relative to Traveling Voters Explained at T. P. A. Banquet; Rabbi Moise Bergman Also Speaks.

## NORTHERN NEBRASKA AND SOUTH DAKOTA ARE IN STORM'S GRIP

Worst Blizzard of the Winter Is Raging; Trains Are Running Late and Mercury Registers 20 to 24 Degrees Below Zero.

(By Evening Herald Special Wire) Norfolk, Neb., Jan. 31.—One of the worst storms of the winter is raging all over northern Nebraska and southern South Dakota today. Trains arriving over the Chicago and Northwestern are about four hours late. A high northwest wind accompanied by about two inches of snow and temperatures around 20 degrees below zero is making conditions serious. Winner, N. D., reports 26 degrees below zero, while at Chamberlain, it is 24 below.  
At Deadwood and Rapid City there are indications that the storm is abating but around Winner it rages so fiercely that it is impossible to see across the street.

Abundant S. D., Jan. 31.—The worst storm of the season is still raging in northern South Dakota early today. All kinds of traffic are discontinued.
