The Markets

Wall Street. New York, March 12.—Interest in rails increased later, the demand for these issues being broader than at any recent period. Consols led the rise at an extra advance of 3/4 points for leading with 1 to 2 1/2 for Erie, Norfolk & Western, Baltimore & Ohio, Western Maryland, Chesapeake & Ohio, and Wheeling and Lake Erie. Union Pacific extended its gain to 2 points and New York Central and Granders also improved. Meanwhile, shipings, coppers, oils and munitions became more uneven with United States Steel, the latter making an extreme decline of a point. Motors also reversed their early course and Bethlehem Steel, new stock, lost 2 1/2 per cent. Mixed changes in international issues created some irregularity in bonds. Chicago Board of Trade. Chicago, March 12.—Misgivings over chances of a railroad strike tended today to depress the wheat market but were offset to some extent by bullish crop reports from the southwest. Later, however, word of rain in Kansas caused the market to give way to a more decisive manner. All grades sold freely. Opening prices, which ranged from the same as Saturday's finish to 1 1/2c lower with May at \$1.57 1/2 to \$1.56 1/2 and July at \$1.56 1/2 to \$1.55 1/2, were followed by numerous irregular changes and then a sharp downturn all around. Snow in Nebraska added to bearish sentiment and so also did absence of export demand. There was also much uneasiness over developments which emphasized the seriousness of danger to shipping from submarines. The market was semi-demoralized at 2 1/2 to 6 1/2c net lower with May at \$1.58 1/2 to \$1.57 1/2 and July at \$1.57 1/2 to \$1.56 1/2. Lightness of offerings kept corn relatively firm. The market, though, showed some sympathy with the weakness of wheat. After opening to off to 1/2c up, prices receded slight general gains and then receded 1/2c below Saturday's finish. Signs of a falling off in the crop movement from the country failed to check subsequent declines that accompanied severe breaks in the value of wheat. The close was nervous at losses of 1 1/2c to 1 3/4c net. Oats sagged with wheat. There was no aggressive selling. Lower quotations on hogs pulled down provisions.
