OVER 2,000 ATTEND SUNDAY SESSIONS OF THE UNION REVIVAL

Yesterday Was a Big Day Among the Christian People of Albuquerque; Stirring Sermon Delivered by Ridley Last Night.

More than twenty-two hundred people attended the various sessions of the Union revival Sunday, and all the ministers who are backing the services reported increased attendance at their morning services. In spite of the inclement weather that prevailed during the day, the Sunday school session in the morning, in the Broadway Christian church, was attended by five hundred people from the four schools on that side. Rev. Ridley delivered a stirring appeal, and almost one hundred people responded and signified their intention of joining the church. For the day there were twenty, making a total of two hundred and thirty new recruits received by the cooperating churches since the revival commenced two weeks ago.

OFFICERS ARREST ANOTHER SUSPECT IN MAIL ROBBERY

Wimberly Charged With Stealing Pouch from Santa Fe Station and Dividing Loot; Is Captured in Tennessee.

J. E. Wimberly, of Memphis, Tenn., was arrested by officers in his home town last week as playing the leading role in the mail pouch robbery, which occurred at the Santa Fe station on the night of February 29. Officers found \$2,300 in his possession. According to officials every thief connected with the stealing has now been caught. It is said that Wimberly is the one who took the mail from the transfer room, having been given the key to the place by Charles Garrett, the mail clerk who is lodged in the county jail. Officials assert that Wimberly and Garrett divided the loot, which totaled approximately \$5,000. The former left on February 21, for El Paso and thence to Memphis. Garrett, they say, gave his share of the profits to Tom Riley. This does not prove, however, that Riley had anything to do with the robbery. The mere finding of the money in his room would not make him liable to prosecution. Proof that he knew the property to be stolen would be necessary. Inspectors had suspicion from the start that some mail clerk was implicated as only clerks had access to the room.

DRY STATE MIGHT CAUSE FLUCTUATION IN TOBACCO SALES

Should New Mexico be voted dry on the date that the liquor interests and their opponents meet at the oil-brook cigar dealers believe that there would be a direct fluctuation in the sale of cigars and cigarettes. According to Frank Kirshner of the Kirshner cigar factory, a real test of the sociability that exists because of the bar room would disappear with its passing. He says that upon after taking a drink at the bar often finish up by treating the crowd to a smoke. Many cigars are thus sold at a time when otherwise men would not think of smoking. Most all saloons sell cigars. Other tobacco dealers believe that the closing of the liquor dens would thus bring about the 1916 competition in their line of business. This change to them, would offset any increase in the demand for smokes, and might increase their sales. Regardless of these different opinions, it is generally thought that the liquor question has a direct bearing on the tobacco dealers.
