Wall Street.
New York, Sept. 19.—The dominant influence in the stock market today was the indication of easier conditions in money which encouraged more general buying by speculators. Much was heard as to the probability of an early announcement at Washington regarding steel and copper prices. Weakness in general motors and Canadian Pacific was followed by a strong rally in these shares. By midday the important stocks were up 1 to 4 points from yesterday's close. Bonds were irregular. Liberty bonds sold at \$99.85 to \$100.

Chicago Board of Trade.
Chicago, Sept. 19.—Notwithstanding that frost which had been looked for, failed to appear, corn today rallied from depression. Misgivings that the frost danger was still imminent seemed to have too strong a hold to be readily dismissed as the bulk of the crop in Kansas and Missouri will not be safe until September 20. Advances however, were not well maintained. Opening prices, which ranged from one-fourth to three-fourths cent lower at \$1.18 to \$1.18 3/4 for December and \$1.15 to \$1.15 3/4 for May, were followed by a sharp upturn to well above yesterday's finish and then a fresh sag.

ZUNI MOUNTAINS TO GROW MILLION POUNDS OF SPUDS

Valencia County to Ship Out 250,000 Pounds of Corn; San Miguel Comes to Front as the Champion Pinto Bean Grower.

Santa Fe, N. M., Sept. 19.—The Zuni mountain district of Valencia county will ship about one million pounds of Irish potatoes this fall, according to the report of County Agent J. G. Hamilton to the state food administration offices here. A quarter of a million pounds of corn will be exported from the county unless an early frost cuts down the crop. Valencia will produce 200,000 pounds of Pinto beans. The oat crop however will be 50,000 pounds short of the county's needs. San Miguel county is one of the banner bean counties. County Agent Gonzales reports an expected harvest of 5,000,000 pounds, 95 per cent of which will be New Mexico Pinto beans. San Miguel will have enough corn, wheat, oats and beans to feed herself, with more potatoes than ever before in the history of the county. More county will have more than enough Pinto beans for local consumption, and about 125,000 bushels of corn. Bernalillo will produce 400,000 pounds of corn, 700,000 pounds of beans and 50,000 pounds of oats, beans and oats being particularly short. Chaves county will export 600,000 pounds of beans and 10,000 bushels of corn. Colfax, with only 50,000 bushels of corn, will have to ship in 120 cars of that staple. She will grow 67,000 bushels of Irish potatoes and export 25 per cent; and expects to raise 15 carloads of beans. Curry county will show nearly 1,000,000 pounds of Pinto beans.
