Guy Pierce Charged With Stealing Company's Money.

HAD BEEN IN LOCAL STATION BUT A BRIEF TWO MONTHS

Guy Pierce, for two months past, and until last Monday morning, the day ticket clerk of the Santa Fe railroad in the local station, was arrested yesterday morning by local officers and placed in the county jail on a charge of embezzlement of company funds.

Pierce came to Albuquerque a little more than two months ago from Kansas City. He had been employed there by the Santa Fe and was an experienced man, having had some service as a conductor in Kentucky and the south.

MURDERER OF DEPUTY SHERIFF ARRESTED

LOUIS RAVERO IN TOOLS FOR KNIFING "LITTLE BILLIE" LONG.

Douglas, Ariz., Oct. 1.—Ranger Old at Nogales has arrested Luis Ravero who is wanted at Bisbee for the murder of "Little Billie" Long, deputy sheriff and night watchman at Bisbee about seven years ago.

The murder of Long was one of the most sensational affairs of the kind in the history of Bisbee. The officer was on his way home one night after having guarded a voting booth during an election, when his slayer attacked him with a knife.

At the time every effort was made to arrest the slayer, but by hard riding he reached the line ahead of his pursuers and escaped capture.

INDIAN INSPECTOR NESLER RESIGNS FROM SERVICE

HAS BEEN ONE OF THE BEST OFFICIALS EVER EMPLOYED BY THE GOVERNMENT.

The people of Albuquerque and of New Mexico will be interested to learn of the resignation from the government Indian service of Inspector Charles F. Nesler, who has made many trips to this city, and who is well known here.

Mr. Nesler was the first inspector appointed in the service under the McKinley administration, and Garrett A. Hobart, vice president at the time, was his backer. He was appointed June 28, 1897.

At the Indian office it is stated that Nesler has been one of the best inspectors the service has known. He is well known in the southwest, having had charge of the allotment of the Kiowa Indian reservation a little over three years ago.

PHELPS-DODGE PEOPLE NOT REMOVING KIBBEY

DOUGLAS DENIES ASKING PRESIDENT TO CAN ARIZONA GOVERNOR.

Walter Douglas, general manager of the Copper Queen Mining company of Bisbee and the other Phelps-Dodge interests in southern Arizona, spent yesterday in Phoenix in attendance on the supreme court, leaving for the south last night, says the Phoenix Gazette.

Late in the afternoon a reporter called on Mr. Douglas and asked him if there was any truth in the statement published that he told a representative citizen of Cochise county that the Phelps-Dodge interests had been to President Roosevelt in an effort to secure the removal of Governor Kibbey.

Mr. Douglas had not yet heard of the publication and his surprise and indignation was great. At this moment Colonel Herring came up and handed Mr. Douglas a copy of the paper. After reading it, Mr. Douglas said: "The statement is false in every respect. It is absolutely a tissue of lies."
