PRIVATE LAND CLAIMS.

Adjournment of Above Entitled Court Until October—Text of Decree in Peralta Case—Preliminary Hearing of Reavis.

After rejecting the Peralta-Reavis, Juan Gid, and other minor land grant claims, and thus lifting the clouds of uncertainty from the titles to about 13,000,000 acres of land in New Mexico and Arizona, the United States court of private land claims has adjourned until the 7th of October, and the judges thereof have departed for the east to enjoy well earned vacations.

DEGREE OF THE COURT. In the court of private land claims, Santa Fe district.

James Addison Peralta-Reavis and Dona Sofia Loreto Mielena de Peralta-Reavis, etc.

vs. Respondent.

On this 3d day of June, A. D., 1895, the above entitled cause coming on to be heard upon the amended petition filed in said cause on the 18th day of November, 1895, and the amended answer and cross petition duly filed by the United States on the 3d day of June, 1895, and after hearing and considering all of the evidence presented by the plaintiffs in support of said claim, and the evidence presented by the government in opposition thereto, and after considering the objections presented by the plaintiffs to the testimony offered by the government the court hereby overrules the same.

The court finds from the evidence that said grant or claim is not entitled to confirmation in the name of the alleged original grantee, Don Miguel Nemeo Silva de Peralta de la Cordoba, nor in the name of anyone else claiming an interest therein.

That the claim is wholly fictitious and fraudulent, and the various documents upon which the same is based, as well as those tending to establish the plaintiff, Dona Sofia Loreto Mielena Silva de Peralta, as the great-granddaughter of Don Miguel Nemeo Silva de Peralta de la Cordoba and the granddaughter of Don Jesus Miguel Nemeo Silva de Peralta de la Cordoba are each and all of them forged, manufactured and have been surreptitiously introduced into the records and archives at Madrid and Seville in the kingdom of Spain and into the records and archives in the city of Guadalajara in the state of Jalisco, republic of Mexico.

And the court further finds that the baptismal and burial records of the parish of San Bernardino and San Salvador, in the county of San Bernardino, in the state of California, copies of which were introduced in evidence by plaintiffs in support of their claim, for the purpose of establishing the identity of one of the petitioners herein, Dona Sofia Loreto Mielena Silva de Peralta, as the daughter of Dona Sofia Loreto Mielena de la Cordoba, and the records of the parish of San Juan de los Rios, in the city of Guadalajara, in the state of Jalisco, republic of Mexico, and the records of the parish of San Juan de los Rios, in the city of Guadalajara, in the state of Jalisco, republic of Mexico, and the records of the parish of San Juan de los Rios, in the city of Guadalajara, in the state of Jalisco, republic of Mexico, are each and all of them forged, manufactured and have been surreptitiously inserted in the records of said mission.

And the court further finds that the plaintiff Dona Sofia Loreto Mielena Silva de Peralta de la Cordoba and her husband and co-plaintiff, James Addison Reavis, now styling himself James Addison Peralta-Reavis, are not in any wise related to or connected with said alleged original grantee, the alleged Don Miguel Nemeo Silva de Peralta de la Cordoba, either by privity of blood or estate but that they and each of them are fraudulent and fictitious claimants for said property described in the amended petition.

It is therefore ordered, adjudged and decreed that the claim to the property which is commonly known and called the Peralta grant, situated in the territories of Arizona and New Mexico, is hereby rejected. (Signed) JOSEPH R. REED, Chief Justice Court of Private Land Claims.

The criminal action of the United States against James Addison Peralta-Reavis, styled himself James Addison Peralta-Reavis, charged with attempted fraud against the government, growing out of the litigation concerning the fictitious Peralta-Reavis grant claim, was called by United States Court Commissioner W. H. Pope at the federal court room this morning. United States Attorneys Matt. G. Reynolds and S. Mallet-Prevost and Assistant United States District Attorney Geo. P. Money appeared for the government, and Mr. Charles A. Spiess for the defendant in the absence of Mr. Catron. At the urgent request of Mr. Spiess, who represented that he had unexpectedly been called into the case, the preliminary hearing was postponed till 2 P. M., when the defendant was required to plead and proceed with the case.
