Owing to the recent changes in the open seasons for various kinds of small game, and many lovers of sport possibly being unaware of these alterations, we publish them below for the information of all who may be desirous of taking advantage of the shooting provided by the enormous increase of all kinds of game fostered by the abundant rains and consequent luxuriant pasturage of the last two summer seasons.

In the territory of New Mexico, deer, elk and antelope may be killed from October 1 to January 1. Buffalo, mountain sheep and grouse, from September 1 to May 1. Wild turkey and quail, October 1 to March 1. Trout or other food fishes, May 1 to November 1, with hook and line only.

It is permissible for persons traveling, or who may be in camp, to kill such game at any time as necessary, only compel them for purpose of subsistence.
