CAPITOL REBUILDERS.

Proceedings of a Business-Like Session Yesterday Afternoon—Plans for the Structure Adopted.

The New Mexico capitol rebuilding board was in session at the Board of Trade rooms last yesterday afternoon.

The work now in progress is paid for out of the funds raised by subscription from citizens of Santa Fe, and a resolution was passed providing that no debts were to be contracted unless the money was on hand to promptly pay same.

The superintendent stated that the grounds were now in shape for employing twenty-five men and he hoped to have the old walls down and the debris all removed in two weeks.

Some weeks ago the resignations of C. C. Blodgett, general manager of the Pecos Irrigation & Improvement company, and W. A. Hawkins, general attorney of the corporation and the Pecos Valley Railway company were sent to the Colorado office.

The connection of these gentlemen with the work of the Pecos companies is too well known and generally appreciated by the public to make commendation necessary.

For the present the gentlemen do not announce their intentions as to other business ventures.

Mr. Blodgett will leave Eddy in a few days, Mr. Percy Hagerman, treasurer, having come down to act as general manager for the present.

There will also be a change in the management of the Argus on December 1, owing to the resignation of J. M. Hawkins. It is not determined who will fill the vacancy.—Eddy Argus.

THE COUNTY SCHOOLS.

Condition of the Public Schools of Santa Fe County—Schools in All But Two Districts—Balances on Hand.

Mr. Cosme Herrera, the capable and vigilant superintendent of county schools, recently returned to Santa Fe from an official visit to the several school districts in the county, and he reports that the outlook for the public schools of the county is brighter than usual.

The following are the cash balances on hand in the several districts except Ammonia, Alum or any other auditor, 40 YEARS THE STANDARD.

The next apportionment of school money will be made on January 1, 1906, at which time the cash resources of both the city and county schools will be so materially increased that in several districts spring and summer terms can be held.
