IN THE SUPREME COURT.

Lucero Refused Writ of Habeas Corpus—Another Habeas Corpus Case Pending.

The territorial supreme court met this morning with Chief Justice Smith presiding and all the associate justices present except Judge Collier.

In re Juan de Dios Lucero, of Mora county, whose application for a writ of habeas corpus was argued yesterday afternoon by Messrs. W. B. Childers and B. M. Read in the affirmative and Messrs. Victory, Jones and Spies in the negative, the court quashed the motion and remanded Lucero to the custody of the sheriff.

A rehearing was granted in the case of J. G. Albright vs. the Texas, Santa Fe & Northern Railroad company. The chief justice announced that the supreme court would meet during the first week in February for the purpose of handing down unavoidably delayed opinions.

A recess was then taken till this afternoon.

WRIT OF HABEAS CORPUS WANTED.

An application was made to Judge Laughlin yesterday for a writ of habeas corpus in re J. F. Jaramillo, of Valencia county, ordered confined by Judge Collier for disobeying an order of the district court. At the instance of Mr. Childers this application was dismissed and a similar application is now pending before the supreme court. Meanwhile Mr. Jaramillo is in Santa Fe in the custody of Sheriff Max Luna, of Valencia county.

COURT IN SOCORRO.

Judge Hamilton reports that the U. S. district court of Socorro, over which he presides, is wide open and that he must return to the city to-night. The U. S. grand jury is still in session.

The New York World yesterday wired its special correspondent here to interview Archbishop Chapelle on the Venezuelan affair. As a result the following terse and patriotic statement of the archbishop appears in the World of this morning:

"I approve most highly the president's message in favor of Venezuela and the Monroe doctrine, even at the peril of war between Great Britain and the United States. I hope that the president and congress will not abandon the stand they have taken. There will be no war, for Great Britain will at last acknowledge that the policy of this country is just and reasonable."

SCHLATTER WANDERS.

The Healer at Bernalillo—May Shake Albuquerque and Travel Southwest—A Much Wanted Man.

Suffering humanity outside of New Mexico is trying hard to definitely locate Schlatter, the healer. Many letters are at the postoffice here addressed to Schlatter and several citizens have this week received letters and telegrams inquiring his postoffice address. Yesterday Mr. F. C. Alley, agent for Wells, Fargo & Co., received a package, which proved to contain a handsome silk handkerchief, from L. W. Burr, of Bakerfield, Cal., with instructions to appear on foot in having it blessed by the healer and returned at once.

Mr. Alley ascertained by wire that Schlatter was in Pena Blanca at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. He undertook to have a messenger carry the handkerchief from Thornton station to the healer at Pena Blanca, but could not arrange it in time, word being received that Schlatter intended leaving for the mountains. A crowd of people from Albuquerque were at Pena Blanca during the afternoon using all their persuasive eloquence to induce the man of mystery to go to Albuquerque, but according to the telegraph agent at Thornton, he persistently declined to go, saying his mission was in the mountains; that the Father directed his footsteps and Albuquerque was not "on his list."

The Albuquerque Citizen of last evening announced the arrival of Schlatter in Old Albuquerque, but this is incorrect.

A MOST UNCERTAIN QUANTITY.

Later advice says that Schlatter spent last night at Santo Domingo. This morning he proceeded toward Bernalillo. The Albuquerque Democrat sent a man to Pena Blanca yesterday and a long interview was the result. As to his movements the Democrat of this morning puts the following:

"From Bernalillo his path is uncertain. He is going to the southwest to begin a long retreat. His movements are uncertain. He may come on down the river to Albuquerque, but he now says he does not know. He awaits 'the will of the Father.' He is coming south and will be in Albuquerque Saturday, or at some point west of here, probably on the Rio Puerco."

In answer to the direct question, "When will you be in Albuquerque?" Schlatter said: "I can not say. My steps now are to the southwest. When the Father directs me to go I will. He may do so in a moment or it may be years. If he says so I will. Good-bye."

TERRITORIAL MINES.

Mining and Milling Operations in Grant County—A Notable Sale—Development Work at La Belle.

The mines in the Pinos Altos are all producing ore and the camp is fairly prosperous. All the mills are running with the exception of the Wagner which will be sold under execution next month. There are no idle miners here, but on the contrary there is room for a few first-class men.

In the Cooney camp, Cooney, Coates and Shible are again running in full blast on their Silver Bar property with the usual good results. Nine men are kept at work on the Copper Queen. The big shaft is being sunk as fast as three shifts of men can put it down, but it will be sometime before the tunnel level is reached. Some good ore is being extracted, says the Deming Headlight.

John Brockman, of Silver City, last week made the purchase of the famous Pierce mine in Arizona for the sum of \$750,000, of which \$15,000 was paid in cash and the balance to be paid within seven months from January 1. The mine is the richest gold property in the entire western country and has already proved a veritable bonanza. Mr. Brockman has put forty men at work and will personally superintend the operations.

The Eberle mine, Mogollon district, is being worked as usual with a small force. Ore is being taken out as prospecting work progresses. It is being piled upon the dumps. Large bodies of good ore are being blocked and the property is in a 1 shape. It is expected that the company will erect a mill in the early spring, when another bullion producer will be added to the many already in operation in the district. The company has abundant capital, and a first class plant, if any, will be erected. The Keno mine, same district, is forging to the front as a producer of ore. A body of very rich ore was struck recently, and work is being pushed vigorously with three shifts. The owners of this valuable property are to be congratulated, as they had many obstacles to overcome, but by pluck and energy they have finally succeeded in reaching the goal of their ambition.

Regarding one of the many promising prospects at La Belle the Cresset says: Johnson & Larson have just started a mine from the main drift on the Denmark. This is one of the leading properties in the locality and has been developed to as great an extent as any other. The main tunnel is a cross-cut about 200 feet in length. The Denmark vein is cut at right angles to 200 feet from the mouth of the tunnel and a drift twenty feet long runs to the left and one sixty feet long to the right, each of these along the vein. A chamber 12x12 has just been made in the longer drift, from which the mine starts. So far the vein has averaged ten feet in width and assays from \$18 to \$40 per ton. The entire vein is a sulphide ore, without waste, so that in this case the pay-streak and width of vein are the same. The ore is unlike any other yet discovered in the district, but in some respects bears a likeness to that found in Anderson's group, which is also a sulphide. The cross-cut also intersects two other veins in the last 100 feet. A boiler and pump has been purchased and it is their intention to have it in operation within six weeks, as they expect to be bothered with water in the vein.

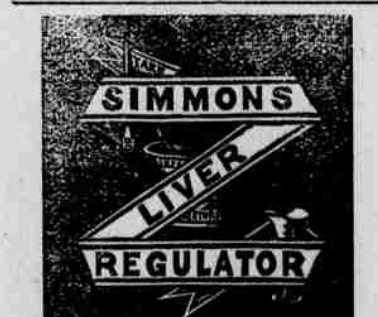
