Marsh's Address

The address of Mr. Marsh said is 2817.
"Likewise through special privilege and legislation enacted by congress, concentration of wealth has gone on in this country until it is now in the hands of a few. A population of 129,000,000 own over \$129,000,000,000 worth of wealth, or nearly one-third of the total national wealth. Less than 100 million people, 22,000,000 own over \$129,000,000,000 worth of wealth, or nearly one-third of the total national wealth. While the average farmer receives less than 10 cents for his produce, the industrial worker receives less than 10 cents for his labor. The big financial and business interests are determined to enact a law after this kind of a law. They have defeated the efforts of the representatives of the progressive farm and labor organizations to secure the enactment of the La Follette-Thomas bill providing for a cap on the income of the Federal tax upon the income of a person with a maximum of 50 per cent upon fortunes in excess of \$10,000,000. The secretary of the treasury admits a national deficit for the next fiscal year of \$500,000,000, but it will more probably be \$1,000,000,000. Full Elections Important
In view of these circumstances, the coming primaries and fall elections are of vital importance. Men should be nominated in the primaries who have stood steadfast by the people and opposed selfish exploitation by financial and business interests. The voters in every state should ask their senators and congressmen why they have not voted to protect the people, and why congress has not done anything for the American people since the last election. The voting record of the senators and congressmen from New Mexico will be of particular interest to the people of your state.

Senator Jones, candidate for re-election has a splendid record of service to the people. In the 54th Congress he voted favorably for the War Risk Insurance and Compensation Bill for Soldiers, Sailors and Sailors, on the Civil Rights Bill for soldiers and sailors, against the Herndon amendment increasing the hours of government employees, and on the "Work or Fight" proposal in the Draft Bill. In the 54th Congress he voted favorably on the Women's amendment, on the motion to strike the labor charter from the league of nations, opposed making strikes of railroad employees unlawful, against the Cummins-Egan law, and for amendment of the center-right report on the Cummins-Ketch bill containing obnoxious labor and the six per cent guarantee provisions. In the 57th Congress he voted favorably for the Packers act, on the Kenyon bill, and on the amendment increasing the secretary of agriculture to limit upon packers making complete reports of their business and to investigate all records and pretenses of packers.
