BROTHERHOODS WILL JOIN WITH GOVERNMENT TO BREAK COAST STRIKE

LEADERS ISSUE AN ULTIMATUM TODAY TO GARY OF U. S. STEEL CORPORATION

Corporation Must Grant an Interview to Committee of American Federation Within Time Limit Set or Steel Workers in All Plants of Great Industry Will Be Called Out—Answer to Gary's Refusal to Treat is Offer to Prove Right of Collective Bargaining.

Washington, Aug. 28.—After a pause here today with the executive committee of the American Federation of Labor, representatives of the steel and iron workers' union made public a letter to H. Gary, chairman of the board of directors of the United States Steel corporation, announcing that the steel workers would be enforced unless the corporation granted an interview to a committee within the time limit.

DREW CARNEGIE LEFT FORTUNE OF THIRTY MILLIONS

OLE HANSON QUITS AS SEATTLE MAYOR TO GO A-FISHING

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 28.—Ole Hanson, Seattle's mayor, who gained nation-wide fame as a result of his stand for Americanism during the general strike here last February, presented his resignation to the city council at 12 o'clock today.

Friedrich Completes a New Ministry to Take Over Hungary
Stephan Friedrich, special plenipotentiary under Archduke Karl's regime, has formed a new cabinet for Hungary in which, by the presidency, he assumes the task of minister of the interior, according to a dispatch from Budapest today.

Church Burning Raids by Georgia Mobs Ends in a Negro's Murder
Eastman, Ga., Aug. 28.—Ellis Cooper, a negro, was shot to death in a church at Okmulgee, Okla., near here today by a mob.

South African Union, Victim of Influenza
Victoria, Union of South Africa, Aug. 28.—General Louis Botha, premier and minister of agriculture of the union of South Africa, died suddenly today following an attack of influenza.

Montenegrins Run Amuck in General Uprising; Serbians Unable to Control Revolt
Belgrade, Aug. 28.—Fighting has been out everywhere in Montenegro and the whole country is in a state of revolution, according to news received here.

Order to Turkey for Armenian Protection From Headquarters
Washington, Aug. 28.—In warning Turkey that messengers of Armenians must stop here, Admiral Marko, British commander of the United States naval forces in Turkey, was acting under instructions from the state department. This was announced today officially.

Enjoins Government From Prosecution of Livestock Brokers
Chicago, Aug. 28.—Federal Judge Sanborn today issued a temporary injunction restraining Secretary of Agriculture Houston and other government officials from revoking the licenses of seven Chicago livestock commission brokers, who are charged by the government with violating the presidential war time proclamation of June 1918, in regard to the feeding of livestock in Texas and before the war.

BARNES AGREES TO NEW PRICE BASIS FOR POOR WHEAT

NEGROES DEMAND AMENDMENT TO PEACE TREATY TO GIVE RACIAL EQUALITY GUARANTY
Senate Foreign Relations Committee Told That "Black Man Has Given Notice" That Oppression Suffered in Past Will No Longer Be Tolerated—Spokesman for Equal Rights League Says There Can Be No Compromise and That Trouble Will Follow if Demands Are Refused.

Washington, Aug. 28.—Asking for an amendment to the peace treaty to be provided for racial equality a delegation of negroes, speaking for the National rights league, told the senate foreign relations committee today that serious trouble might be expected unless better treatment were accorded negroes in the United States.

President Leaves Wednesday on Speaking Tour in Behalf of Peace Treaty Ratification
Washington, Aug. 28.—President Wilson will leave Washington next Wednesday on his speaking tour in the interest of the peace treaty, and will deliver his first address in Columbus, Ohio, next Thursday probably in the evening. Cincinnati is not included in the itinerary, but Secretary Tumulty announced the president would speak at Indianapolis. Accompanying the president will be Mrs. Wilson, Admiral Cary T. Grayson, Secretary Tumulty and a corps of secretaries and stenographers.

Big Four Chiefs Issue an Ultimatum to Rebellious Trainmen in the West
