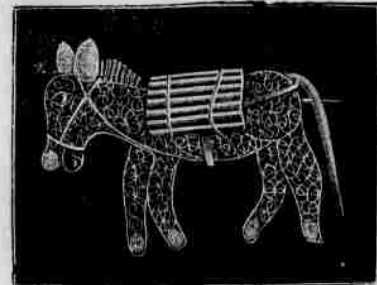

H. N. Fliedner and Carl Metzger, two young men in the employ of the Santa Fe Central Railway Company, had a very narrow escape yesterday. While driving past the evaporating plant, the team of horses which they were driving suddenly became scared and quickly turning, breaking the wagon pole, overturned the wagon and threw the occupants to the ground. Metzger escaped with a bruised neck, while it was necessary in Fliedner's case to call in a physician, who made an examination and found that he had several ribs broken.

At the regular meeting of the board of education held Monday night the following members were present: President, T. B. Catron; Celestino Ortiz, Pedro Robal, E. S. Andrews. A quorum not being present only minor business was transacted, subject to the approval of the board, as the hearing of reports and allowing of bills. The treasurer's report showed the sum of \$700 in the treasury and all bills paid. The superintendent in his report said all the schools were in a good condition, although the attendance had fallen off somewhat on account of the extreme cold weather and sickness among the smaller children.

During February there were in Santa Fe 17 clear days, 6 partly cloudy days and 6 cloudy days. On 9 days .01 of an inch or more of rain fell. The mean atmospheric pressure was 30.01 and the highest was 30.42 on February 21 and the lowest was 29.43 on February 2. The highest temperature was 47 on February 2 and the lowest was 4 below zero on February 15. The greatest daily range was 29 degrees on February 15 and the least daily range was 7 on February 25. The prevailing direction of the wind was southeast and the total movement 5,382 miles. The maximum velocity was 46 miles per hour from the south on February 2. The precipitation was 1.31 while the average for 31 years is .75.

Samuel Golding has moved his general merchandise store from San Pedro to the town of Cerrillos.

A good and appreciative audience greeted the Schubert Symphony Club of Chicago at the court house on last Saturday evening. The program was well worth hearing. Unlike the conventional musical organizations, they possessed vocal and dramatic as well as instrumental resources. Each member of the club is an artist. A neat sum was realized for the benefit of the high school library.

The forecast is for rain or snow tonight and tomorrow with easterly winds. The maximum temperature yesterday was 48 at 12:15 p. m., and the minimum was 34 at 5 a. m. This temperature at 6 o'clock this morning was 35.

Advices to the local office of the weather bureau state that March 1 and 2 were the coldest days of the winter in the Taos valley, the temperature falling to 10 and 5 degrees below zero on these dates.

LEGISLATIVE POINTERS. Leonard Wood county, with Santa Rosa as the county seat, may appear on the legislative boards at any moment.

The committee which visited Las Cruces went to El Paso and there witnessed a bull fight. One was enough for Hon. Cristoval Sanchez, who says that, though it is the spot of his ancestors and his race, yet it is one of the most disgusting sights he ever witnessed. He wants no more of it.

Among the many reports of legislative deals and prospective laws which are in circulation about the legislative halls, one rumor has crept in that Cupid has been at work successfully among the House employes and that a new diamond ring is being worn. The session is not without its romance.

Santa Fe county lost about \$243,000 worth of taxable property by the annexation of Epanola precinct to Rio Arriba county. However, there is no use kicking against the inevitable. While Rio Arriba county was about this it might just as well have taken the Chilmayo and Santa Cruz precincts.

Governor Otero this forenoon sent to the legislative Council the nomination of James S. Duncan of Las Vegas, to be public printer. This was unanimously confirmed. It was rather unexpected to some of the members of the Council, whereas to others it was not much of a surprise. Councilman Duncan was warmly congratulated by his colleagues upon his preferment. The New Mexican joins in these congratulations and wishes the new public printer the fullest measure of success.

Council Bill No. 95, introduced by Councilman Amado Chavez, and House Bill No. 145, introduced by Representative B. G. Grant, granting to the Woman's Board of Trade of the city of Santa Fe the lot on the old Palace property for the purpose of erecting thereon a public library building should be passed. It is a local measure and desired by every good citizen of Santa Fe, regardless of party. A fine public library on Washington avenue would be of benefit not only to this city, but also to many tourists and healthseekers who visit this city annually.

Boston Firm Falls. Boston, Mass., March 4.—The failure of A. B. Turner and Bro. of this city was announced on the stock exchange today. The firm was largely interested in Massachusetts consolidated mining and in western railway products. The failure is attributed to the stringency of the money market.

Boston Wool Market. Boston, March 4.—The action of the federal authorities in placing an embargo on wool has had the effect of bringing trade to a standstill. Territorial wools are fairly firm; fine steeple wools are quotable at 55 @ 56, scoured basis; fine medium is not quotable above 50; with medium at 45 @ 46.
