LEGISLATIVE POINTERS.

Senator Andrews was in his seat today for the first time.

Nearly all of the Albuquerque delegation returned home last evening on the early train.

Leonard Wood county with Santa Rosa as the county seat is on the legislative boards and will likely be a successful play. Railroad and townsfolk are working for it and they will come mighty near getting what they want.

The Council bill regulating district attorney districts and to increase their number, passed the house yesterday morning with a slight amendment. It is a good measure in the interest of the better and more economical administration of justice. Representative W. H. H. Llewellyn and Representative Howard did good work in pushing it through.

This morning there were repeated telegrams for certified copies of the act creating Sandoval county received from Albuquerque. Just what has been discovered in it, if anything, is not known here, but there seemed to be great anxiety on the part of Albuquerque people to secure certified copies of the act.

The apportionment bill is being thoroughly and quietly discussed among the members. It is understood that the northwest part of the territory will be given increased representation. It is also rumored that the representation of Valencia county will be reduced and the representation from the southern part of the territory will be increased.

Councilman Thomas Hughes of Albuquerque, took the bull by the horns on the creation of Sandoval county and was not discouraged either by the withdrawal of the bill once or by its defeat once. He bobbed up serenely with it the third time and, as though justifying the old adage, it went through unanimously and it is not necessary for Mr. Hughes to use a megaphone to hear him chuckle.

Albuquerque yesterday took the House by storm and the chamber was crowded. The first canvass of the House failed to show enough votes to suspend the rules to take up the Sandoval county bill and hence the caucus was called. After that it was passed without any friction and so quickly as to disappoint a large number of spectators who were present in hope of seeing a fight.

A delegation of citizens of the town of Santa Rosa, consisting of C. H. Stearns, merchant; George H. Smith, Jr., merchant; and E. R. Wright, United States court commissioner and real estate agent, has been in town working for the creation of Leonard Wood county, with Santa Rosa as the county seat. The new county to take the place of the present county of Guadalupe. A strip off of Valencia county, 18 miles wide is to be added to the new county. Considerable work has been done by the delegation and the chances for the passage of the bill are not at all bad. The full text of the bill can be found on the third page of today's issue.

James M. Hervey, Esq., a Roswell attorney, has been strongly recommended to Governor Otero by influential citizens of Chaves and Eddy counties for the district attorneyship of the district composed of those two counties. In fact the New Mexican is informed that his endorsement is practically unanimous.

The House has a large number of bills on the table for consideration and it now looks as though night sessions will be necessary in order to complete all business.

It is reported that there are two candidates for appointment to the office of district attorney for the district composed of Grant and Sierra counties. Representative R. M. Turner is one and R. P. Barnes, a Silver City attorney, is the other. The Grant county republicans are somewhat divided upon the question; a good many of them recommend Mr. Turner, while others including W. H. Newcombe, chairman of the Grant County Republican Central Committee, have recommended Mr. Barnes.

The appointment of a district attorney for the district composed of Bernalillo, Valencia, McKinley and Sandoval counties is an interesting topic in Albuquerque and in legislative circles. Frank W. Clancy Esq., the present incumbent, who has a first class record has been recommended by many of the leading republican citizens of the district for re-appointment. E. W. Dobson Esq., also of Albuquerque has some strong backing including the Hubbell family. The situation is quite warm and interesting.

It is reported in legislative circles that the appointment of district attorney for the district composed of San Miguel, Mora, Guadalupe and Quay counties will likely go to S. B. Davis, of Las Vegas, an attorney who has office room with Councilman C. A. Spies. Mr. Davis has been recommended for the position by Chief Justice Mills, Councilman Spies and the Republican central committee of San Miguel, Mora, Guadalupe and Quay counties. Eusebio Chacon, Las Vegas attorney and interpreter for the United States court of private land claims, has also some good backing; but, according to reports, Mr. Davis will get the plum, which in that district is worth several thousand dollars per annum.
