### JUDGE MILLS SCORES JURY

Court Incensed When Verdict of Not Guilty is Returned in Robbery Case.

Raton, N. M., Oct. 3.—"How a body of American men, after hearing the evidence in this case, could bring in a verdict of not guilty is more than I can see. One thing is certain, and that is that you have shown yourselves unfit and incompetent to serve this court in any capacity. The jury is discharged for this term of court."

With these words, Judge W. J. Mills, who has been holding district court for Colfax county, showed his displeasure at the verdict rendered in the case of the Territory vs. J. G. Garland, who was on trial for robbery.

It is hinted that the jury was tampered with, and it is understood that an investigation is being made by the court. This same jury freed several defendants during this term of court where the evidence pointed to a conviction, and it is generally believed here that the jury was "fixed." But by whom is not known, and rumor has not as yet connected any one person with the affair.

### ENLISTS TO ESCAPE PRISON

Las Vegas Young Man Joins Army After Passing Worthless Checks—May Yet Be Prosecuted.


Las Vegas, N. M., Oct. 3.—Amado J. Ortiz, who joined the regular army at the local recruiting station and left here Saturday, is wanted for forgery. The young man issued two checks, drawn on well known parties, amounting to \$100. He spent most of the money immediately, and then, fearing to remain until his crime was found out, enlisted in the army, after he had received assurance that he would immediately be sent to Fort Bliss, for which place he departed on last Saturday. Sheriff Cleofes Romero is now negotiating with the army officer in charge of the post in an effort to have the young man returned here for trial.
