TRAVELING TROWEL HAS LEFT THE PASS CITY

Famous Itinerant Masonic Emblem With Splendid Special Train Now En Route to City of Mexico.

The famous silver traveling trowel of the Masons, carried on a splendid special train and escorted by a distinguished party of members of the order, arrived in El Paso Friday and has left on its trip to the City of Mexico where it will be received by Anahuac lodge. The El Paso Times says of the stay of the visitors in that city:

They were met at the station by Worshipful Master T. C. Lee, and all the past masters in the city. The visitors were conducted to the temple where the lodge went into session, and the Masonic emblem, the silver trowel, was presented in a speech by E. E. Speth, custodian of the trowel and master of Southern California lodge No. 278. Speeches were also made by Master H. Flint, past grand master, and Dana R. Weller, senior grand warden of the Masons of California.

On behalf of the local lodge, Worshipful Master Lee accepted the trowel. Responses were also made by L. P. Holtz and Dr. Frank Whitman. It is said that the speech of Dr. Whitman was one of the most impressive and inspiring that has been heard in this city.

The trowel was then placed on exhibition and later was formally returned to the care of the custodian and taken to the train.

The "Trowel" Masons spent the day seeing El Paso. Most of them went on our ride to Fort Bliss, the country club and to Juarez. Others went out to the cement works, while some were taken in automobiles for rides about the country.

ELKS FIESTA WILL SANITARUM GOES UP IN SMOKE; LOSS \$10,000

WHOOPE TODAY SPECTACULAR PARADE THIS AFTERNOON AT 4

Governor Curry, Mayor Lester, City and County Officials and Every Elk in Town Will Be in Line.

The fore-runner of the big Elks' fiesta, scheduled to occupy the center of the stage in Albuquerque for the next week, will be the magnificent tree street parade, which will leave the Elks' building promptly at 4 o'clock this afternoon and traverse the principal streets of the city. The parade will be in charge of the Elks and will throw Ringling Brothers, Barnum and Bailey's and all other like aggregations into the shade. Business will practically be suspended from 4 o'clock on, and the city will be a scene of various attractions and divisions of the parade will begin to form into line at the corner of Fifth street and Gold avenue. The parade will be led by a float carrying the Elks' mascot, a young bull, followed by the Elks' band, the Elks' fire engine, the hook and ladder trucks and all other fire fighting paraphernalia that can be attached to horses will be one of the big features of the parade.

Following the Elks will come the snake charmer's wagon in which five dozen rattlesnakes will be confined. The snake charmer, whose identity is not known, will draw fangs from the snakes and hand them to people along the route as souvenirs of the parade. Ben Hur in a chariot, the will man from Zulu, the only elephant in captivity, will follow in quick succession, making an array of wonderful attractions seen only once in a life time. Leonard and his troupe of dancers will follow, and the parade will break in at this point to pave the way for the attraction to follow, which will be two Salome dancers direct from the palace of Abdolati in the Orient.
