Dr. David Beaton, university lecturer of Chicago, will give an extra lecture on Monday night, April 15, at 8 o'clock, in the university chapel. TRES HERMANOS MINES REOPENED

A corporation has just been formed for the purpose of working the Tres Hermanos mines near Golden, Santa Fe county, recently purchased by Albert P. Hunter, of Philadelphia, Pa. The stock of the company, it is said, will be mostly owned by Las Vegas people, which is a practical guarantee of the production of the mines. The Tres Hermanos property has been known to local parties for many years during most of which period the mines have not been worked on account of the low price of silver and lead. The great advance in the market quotations on these metals which has prevailed in the last few months, however, makes the property commercially available and Mr. Hunter expects within the next sixty days to be shipping ore to the nearby smelters at a good profit. Ross are also directors.

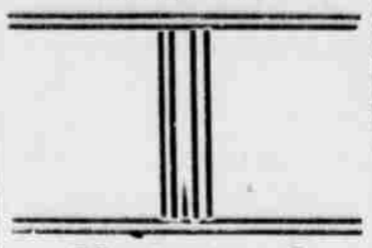
