DIRTY CATTLE ARE BARRED BY PACKERS ASSOCIATION

Farmers Must Keep Their Pens Clean or Their Stock Won't be Purchased.

Chicago, May 31.—The executive committee of the American Meat Packers' association, whose membership embraces 275 slaughter houses in twenty-seven states, met here today and adopted a resolution asking all inspected slaughter houses to buy cows and other animals subject to post-mortem examination by the United States government.

WALTER S. CHEESMAN DEAD IN DENVER

Was Identified With Many of the Largest Enterprises in Colorado.

Denver, Colo., May 31.—Walter S. Cheesman, president of the Denver Union Water company, and one of the foremost capitalists and citizens of Denver, died unexpectedly at 3:35 this morning. He suffered a stroke of paralysis last Wednesday, but his death was not anticipated by his physicians or friends.

Mr. Cheesman was born in Hempstead Harbor, Long Island, June 27, 1828, and came to Denver in 1860, establishing himself in the drug business.

He since had been identified with many of the largest enterprises in Colorado and had accumulated great wealth, being the largest owner of real estate in the business district of this city.
