The big outfit of Nathan Barth left Monday morning and the outfit of Anderson Romero left last night. P. A. Hubbell and Solomon Luna, probably the largest raisers living here, have been with their flocks for a month past.

A large number of men are needed just now for the lambing, and the demand for help will continue with the shearing. The native villages of the territory are deserted of male residents at this time of year, either taking care of their own flocks or helping the larger owners.

The season so far has been very favorable. The indications are that New Mexico will have another big crop of lambs for the market this fall.

DEATH VALLEY SCOTT GOES BACK TO MINES

Man Who Took the Fast Ride Across the Continent Says He Needs the Money.

Walter Scott, the Death Valley miner, spent two hours in the city last night, while en route to Barstow, Cal. He was traveling on train No. 8 and lounged around the station platform for two hours while the train was waiting. He wore a dark suit of clothes, a broad-brimmed black hat, a costume much more modest than the one he paraded when making his famous ride across the country three years ago. He did not even visit the buffet at the Alvarado.

From persons on the station he inquired about the Bland district and other gold producing districts of the country. He said that he was going back to Death Valley and make another false.

Scotty was credited recently with having taken up a claim in South Dakota with the intention of quitting mining "and making money."

HE WOULD PREVENT WATER POWER MONOPOLY

Secretary Ballinger Determined to See That Small Investor Has Chance to Develop Resources.

Washington, April 27.—Secretary Ballinger of the interior department is determined if possible to prevent monopolistic or speculative interests from securing control of water power sites and has instructed the director of the geological survey to investigate such natural resource to investigate domain outside the national forests not included within withdrawals for reclamation purposes. The secretary will report the findings to Congress with recommendations for legislative action.

RAPID PROGRESS ON FEDERAL BUILDING

Walls Are Being Laid and several Cars of Steel Have Arrived.

Two cars of steel, including roof trusses for use on the construction of the new federal building, having been built, arrived in the city yesterday and are being hauled to the grounds today. A small army of bricklayers have been brought to the city from Santa Fe and are already engaged in erecting the walls of the building. Superintending Architect Roberts stated this morning that the work on the building was progressing rapidly and should all go well, the walls will be above the fence, which surrounds the grounds, in the course of the next two weeks. The structural terra cotta, which will form the interior walls, has also been approved by the supervising architect at Washington and will be placed in position in the near future.

The new building will be entirely fire proof and when completed will be one of the finest in the Southwest.

Owing to the limited appropriation granted for the building of this structure, many of the elaborate features as designed on the revised plans of the building, have been modified while some have been entirely eliminated. Superintending Architect Roberts states that an additional appropriation of \$10,000 would be necessary to properly carry out the plans as recently revised in Washington. The two large entrances, which were to have been elaborately decorated, have, on account of limited means, been greatly modified. The corridors of the building have also been simplified and while the building will be spacious and modern in every way, the decorative work could be greatly improved upon and made to correspond with the original revised plans with an additional appropriation of \$10,000.


