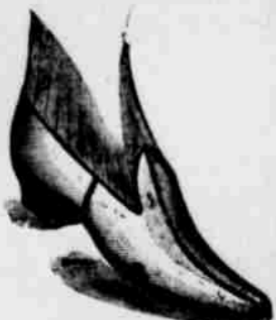

DENVER LIQUOR DEALER DEAD.
Denver, July 29.—Simon A. Lifschitz, a wealthy liquor dealer, was found dead on the floor of his bedroom this morning. Some bruises under his chin excited the suspicion that he had been murdered but physicians declared death was probably due to natural causes. The coroner will investigate.

New York, July 29.—Alfred Lauterbach, a son of Edward Lauterbach, a prominent lawyer and politician, was killed this morning in an automobile accident, the machine colliding with the guard rail on the approach to the railroad bridge on Williams bridge road.

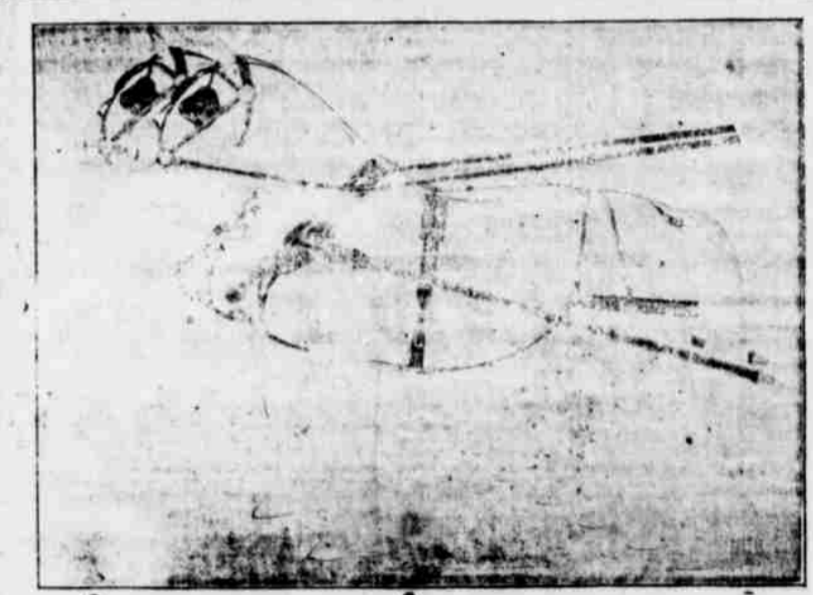
