Exhumed Chase's Body.
Last week, before the trial began a deputy sheriff accompanied by two medical experts went to Torrance county and exhumed the body of James Chase.

The reason for so doing has not yet come to light, except in the testimony as to the location and effect of the wounds.

The deputy sheriff stated that despite the fact that Chase had been buried two years, his body was intact. His features could be readily recognized and his body was in such a state of preservation that the bullet holes could be readily traced.

The clothing in which the remains were buried was also in good condition.

This term of court is attracting wide spread attention in Torrance county and here are several hundred people here.

The Clark case is attracting attention but the center of interest will be the trial of Domingo Valles, charged with the murder of J. Francisco Chavez at Pagan Springs.
