### IMPROVEMENT LEAGUE DISTRIBUTES SEEDS

Children Are Given the Means With Which to Beautify the City and Are Working Hard.

The 1,241 packages of flower seeds distributed among the school children of Greater Albuquerque yesterday by the seed committee of the Civic Improvement League was only the first instalment of the seed the league expects to give the children to help beautify the city. A second instalment, equally as large as the first will be distributed in about two weeks.

The ladies composing the seed committee are Mrs. W. V. Strang, Mrs. P. G. Cornish and Mrs. Frank McKee. Mrs. Strang, chairman of the committee, said this morning that the seeds distributed yesterday were for only the earliest varieties of flowers and shrubs. The later varieties, such as cosmos, will be distributed later.

While the entire membership of the league has been very busy for several weeks laying plans and collecting donations of seeds, the work the seed committee did yesterday was the most arduous. Almost a half ton of seeds was at the disposal of the committee yesterday for distribution. The many packages were divided among the schools of the various wards of the city proper, the two schools of Barajas, the school at Martinez Town, Old Albuquerque and St. Vincent's academy and St. Mary's hall were each given a share according to their enrollment of pupils. The principals of the various schools voluntarily distributed the packages. According to instructions from the Civic Improvement League ladies, only pupils of the second grade and higher were given seed. The pupils took the seeds gladly and there were many little hands at work late last evening and early this morning making flower gardens.

The packages distributed at the second instalment will be mostly of cosmos. The league expects to have between 500 and 700 packages of this kind of flower seed alone, to distribute to the school children. The city will be a bower of nodding cosmos during the irrigation congress if the plans of the Civic Improvement League do not miscarry. The flowers come in September and remain till late in October, and as they demand very little cultivation and very little moisture, every vacant lot and street corner will doubtless produce a crop.

Among the latest donations received by the league are fifty pounds of castor beans. The green stalk and red pods of the castor bean growing make a very pretty yard adornment. This gift comes from the Bittner-Stamm company.

Other persons of the city making donations of seeds are as follows: Dr. Taylor-Goodman, Mrs. A. J. Malloy, B. H. Briggs, S. Vann, Mrs. George H. Brower and Mrs. W. W. Strong.

### SULLIVAN GETS TERM IN THE PENITENTIARY

Pleads Guilty and Is Sentenced by Judge Abbott to Serve Two Years For \$5 Grant.

"Con," Sullivan, the confidence man arrested here March 19 by Santa Fe officers when caught red handed in fleeing a Santa Fe passenger by the name of Davis out of \$5, yesterday pleaded guilty to charges and was sentenced to two years in the New Mexico penitentiary.

F. J. McKeon, the young man working with Sullivan and arrested at the same time, was sentenced to six months in the penitentiary. Sullivan has the reputation of having worked confidence games all over the west and also of having done several terms in various penitentiaries of the country. The local authorities know nothing of the criminal record of McKeon, and believe that he is a new hand at the business and was probably a student under Sullivan.

### HIGHER PRICES COULDN'T MAKE HIM LIKE IT

Professor Threw Tough Beef-steak to the Winds After Vainly Trying to Make an Impression on It.

The eating of a piece of high priced beef-steak from the window of the dormitory of the University of New Mexico has caused a member of the faculty of that institution to look elsewhere for a boarding place, according to a student. The incident took place a few days ago, but whether the steak deserved its fate has not been ascertained.

A number of students were partaking of the morning meal when they were frozen cold by a blast of fresh morning air. The stalwart figure of a professor stood silhouetted in the open window. One arm protruded through the opening and in the outstretched hand was a fork from which dangled a ragged triangular piece of meat. Several streaks of day light gave evidence that a knife had been thrust through the piece but had not severed it to any great extent. The hand shook violently and for several seconds the steak danced in mid air. A final desperate shake and the meat slipped from the fork and fell to the ground with a thud. The window was slammed down and the pedagogic returned to his place at the table. And the price of steak has gone up.

### ALBUQUERQUE BROWNS ARE MAKING GOOD

New Mexico Players With Pueblo Get Favorable Mention.

That Albuquerque had a baseball team last year is evident from the fact the erstwhile Brownies are cutting in the Western League at Pueblo. They were the whole thing in a practice game played at Pueblo on Sunday, according to a dispatch to the Denver Republican.

The dispatch is as follows: "The two squads of the Pueblo Western League team, known as Patterson's regulars and Jackson's Yanigans, played this afternoon, the regulars winning by a score of 17 to 4. A number of the new pitchers were tried out and all of them seemed to give satisfaction to the large number of fans present. Nichols, the Denver youngster, was not in form, but his delivery made a good impression. Gaizano appeared at third during the first few innings, after which he went into the box. While Gaizano is believed to have the making of a good pitcher it is probable that he will be shifted to third during the first part of the season. During the game Hoy Corhan made a home run to left field at his first time to bat. Clancy, one of the youngsters signed for this season, connected twice for a three-bagger and a two-bagger.

### SOLDIERS ARE ANXIOUS TO VISIT ALBUQUERQUE

Fort Wingate Officers and Men Are Already Discussing the Congress and Big Fair.

Captain Clark M. Carr and E. L. Medler, who returned yesterday from a trip to Captain Carr's lumber interests at Guam and a visit to Fort Wingate, say that the officers and men at the fort are already discussing the approaching territorial fair and the Sixteenth National Irrigation Congress. Though the troops will most likely be called to California in October for maneuvers, the officers feel that they will be able to find time to come to the fair before going to California.

Improvements are still being made at Fort Wingate. Several new buildings have gone up within the past year and more are contemplated. Fort Wingate is one of the most beautiful spots in New Mexico. The fort occupies a high elevation looking toward the northwest. A pine forest surrounds it on three sides. The fort is three miles from the railroad. A fine macadamized road has been built from the fort to the railroad station at Wingate recently. Every turn of this road is within full view of the fort.

### ALBUQUERQUE MAN WAS A JOLLY SAILOR

But One Trip Around the Horn Was Enough and He Would Rather Drive Hacks.

One James Ward, well known in lively stable circles in Albuquerque by the euphonious name of "Mutton," has just returned to the city after an absence of three years, during which time he learned to be a sailor and made a trip from San Francisco around the horn to Italy, and back to New York.

"You get \$25 and board shipping from an American port, and \$15 and board when shipping from an European port," said Ward this afternoon, "but it is worth \$150 and one life."

When in Albuquerque Ward drove a hack for W. L. Trimble & Co. When he left Albuquerque three years ago he drifted westward. He landed in San Francisco shortly after the earthquake and fire and one day when walking down what was left of Market street after the fire was through with it, he was approached by a man who asked him if he wanted to make a trip to Italy. Ward said he did. The next question the man asked him was if he had ever done any sailing. Ward said that he hadn't. The man said that made no difference. All that he had to do was to tell the consul a few lies. The consul asked him if he was a sailor and Ward, according to instructions, smiled profusely and said he was. He went aboard the ship, the Huron of Liverpool, and when about a knot and a half (whatever that is) out at sea, the captain found that he had a green gang. When the captain found this out he called all the men before him and told them to learn all they could for they were taking a trip from which they might never return. The voyage around the Horn was a very dangerous one and they would need to know all there was to be known about sails to get through safely. Ward said that what the captain told them was very true, and that one trip was enough for him.

The ship was loaded with old iron from San Francisco and was loaded so heavily that instead of riding the seas, which run thirty feet high around the Horn, she stuck her nose right into them. At times the ship would be totally under water for twenty minutes. A man on deck would have to grab the life line and hold on for dear life all that time and would come out half drowned when the wave had passed. The shifts were four hours on and four hours off. It took six months to make the voyage. Ward says that he shipped back to New York and that he hasn't been off land since.

### THE SZECHENYIS IN VIENNA.

Vienna, April 1.—Count Laszlo Szechenyi and the countess formerly Miss Gladys Vanderbilt arrived in this city this morning. It is their intention to remain in Vienna for some time. They reached Budapest yesterday from Fiume. A large and curious crowd had gathered at the railroad station to greet the couple, but the friends of the couple, in order to evade this, had made arrangements for them to leave the train before it put into the depot.

### MISSOURI PROXY FOR THOMAS.

New York, April 1.—Augustus Thomas, playwright and friend of William J. Bryan, was anxious to go to the Democratic convention in Denver and vote for the Nebraskan, but local politicians told him he could not be a delegate, if that were his purpose.

Hearing of his disappointment, Mr. Thomas' friends in Missouri made arrangements so that he may hold the proxy of a delegate from that state, and today it was announced here that he will second the nomination of Mr. Bryan.

### FIFTEEN ROUNDS TO A DRAW.

San Francisco, April 1.—Abe Attell and Battling Nelson fought fifteen rounds which ended in a draw last night. The contest was hard fought throughout.

### IN THE DISTRICT COURT

The case of the territory vs. Marguete Baca alias Guiterrez, which was taken up yesterday morning, went to the jury late this afternoon, and the case of Robert Suris, charged with larceny from the person, was called.

Baca was charged with entering a house occupied by Mrs. Lola Romero de Chavero with intent. The testimony showed that a window in the house had been broken and that Baca was seen near the house shortly afterwards.

Suris was arrested by the Albuquerque police. He has been in jail since his arrest and when brought before the court to be arraigned pleaded not guilty.
