Notice of Restoration of Public Lands to Settlement and Entry Department of the Interior, General Land Office, Washington, D. C., May 8, 1908. Warning is hereby expressly permitted to gain or exercise any right whatever under any settlement or occupation begun prior to August 1, 1908, and all such settlement or occupation is hereby forbidden.
