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SCORE GOVERNOR McDONALD FOR TRAVELING AUDITOR'S REPORT

Carlsbad, N. M., Nov. 13.—The recent report on conditions in Eddy county, in which the traveling auditor of the state informs Governor McDonald that there is a shortage of over \$16,000 in the accounts of county clerk A. R. O'Quinn, and alleges other grave irregularities, is openly resented as malicious and insinuating in a letter sent this morning by the board of county commissioners to the governor, and copies sent to various newspapers of the state.

The letter charges the auditor with numerous misstatements, great exaggerations and a misrepresentation of conditions in Eddy county, apparently prepared with a willful purpose to injure the officers of the county. It attacks Governor McDonald for conspiring in making the auditor's office a publicity bureau, and claims that the report is punishment heaped on the commissioners for opposing the arbitrary increases in Eddy county valuations.

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
