High barometer has rapidly overspread most of the western country during the last 24 hours, giving fair, cool weather with clear skies, generally. However, a small strip of relatively low pressure continues along the Canadian border, with cloudiness and rain or snow. It is much colder this morning over the central Rocky mountain region and the Salt Lake basin, but temperatures are inclined upward over the North Pacific coast. The eastward drift of the high area should give this section fair and colder weather tonight, and fair and warmer Sunday.
