

County representatives are elected this fall for Territorial legislature of 1886.

The abuse heaped upon the editor of the Gazette by the territorial press for using the simple word "greaser," is altogether uncalled for and unjournalistic.

It was said that S. P. Railton influenced elected Dick Hudson last fall for assessor of Grant county. Will the Grant county papers tell us the amount for which Dick assessed that road?

We are in receipt of the Greenburg, Ind., Standard, which is 50 years old, and asks the Advocate to X. If Mr. Hazlerigg, the publisher, will come west he can get rich in less time than that X goes.

During the last fiscal year 387,821 immigrants arrived in the United States, the number being 122,013 less than the immigration of the preceding year, and 401,171 less than during the year ended June 30, 1882.

It is rumored that C. W. Greene will be indicted before the grand jury for robbing the territory on the competing job. It would be more commendable in the complainant to offer up prayer and ask for the Lord to look in mercy upon those who are born to break the 8th commandment.

The President will not rescind his order requiring the cattle men to vacate the Indian Territory in 40 days. This will have the effect of stimulating the price of grazing lands in New Mexico. Kansas has no grazing land, Texas is in a like predicament, Colorado is all taken up, and about the best thing the cattle men can do is to market their cattle and go out of the business, or come to New Mexico and invest in silver mines.

JOHN ROACH vs. FREE TRADE. No doubt the protectionist party will now have something to harp on and use the failure of John Roach, the ship builder, as a stepping stone to prove the evil effects of free trade. The protectionists can receive very little consolation from this, however, as the effects of free trade are not now, neither have they been since the election of Cleveland, in effect. It was not the result of free trade that caused the failure of John Roach, which threw 1,500 men out of employment. It was due to the undisputable fact that Zach Chandler, who stood in with John Roach, is no longer able to swing the influence in Washington and get fat appropriations from the government, which he turned over to his friend John B. No longer will Zachariah and Johnny stand in on their fat steals. No longer will Johnny take up his residence in Washington and hang on to the coat-tails of Zach as he has done for the last eight years. Times have changed. The failure of John Roach is no public calamity, but on the other hand the thousands which Zach and Johnny acquired by shrewd lobbying will now go to maintain hundreds of poor contractors and ship-builders, who under the old regime of affairs could never hope to be anything but the tool of the influential monopolist.

For the present, a few men may be out of employment directly speaking, but indirectly, and in the course of a few months the effects of the broad policy taken by our Secretary of War will begin to tell—when to the surprise of protectionist, justice will be coupled with liberality and general good.

THE HERO DEAD. Another great man has passed away from life. General Grant, the statesman and soldier, the financier and author, the man to whom the greatest honors ever paid by foreign natives were given, and who can only be remembered with esteem and respect. The men who participated in the war of the rebellion will regret the death of their famous leader. The whole United States will mourn the death of him, who was their chief at the time of their greatest prosperity, and who stepped in and distinguished himself in fighting their battles when their sovereign power was threatened with destruction. We can only add, like the widow, your 'mite' in his praise. Requisite in pace.

IN MEMORIAM. DIED.—At the camp of his troop near Grafton, N. M., Captain O. B. Boyd, of troop K., 8th cavalry, at 9:10 p. m., July 23, 1885. Many will remember the jovial Capt. O. B. Boyd, and regret that he, like many others, has departed to "that bourne whence no man returneth." He leaves a wife and three of a family, two sons and one daughter, who will sadly miss the father and genial companion he was. Among his brother officers in the 8th cavalry he was esteemed and respected, and a wide circle of acquaintances, in Texas, will mourn one who has made many an hour pass pleasantly. The Captain was sick only a few days, and the distance being so far, it was impracticable for any of his family to be present at his last moments. He was temporarily interred at Fairview, Capt. Fechet doing all that a man could do, both to soothe his dying hours, and to show respect to his remains. "Though he were dead, yet shall he live."
