NEW MEXICO HOLDS STRONG CARD SAYS WELLIVER: Senate Plans to Let Her Alone Says Writer Who Repeats Falsehood That Constitution is "Unamendable."

To keep both Arizona and New Mexico out of the union, so far as the present session of congress is concerned— But to let New Mexico in at the end of the next regular session, while still keeping Arizona out— Such is the present plan of the stand-pat organization in control of the senate, says Judson C. Welliver in the Washington Times. Involved in this plan is, very possibly, the political control of the senate after March 4, 1913. It is generally conceded that the democrats will make considerable senatorial gains in the elections of that year. A gain of five senators by them and a loss of five to the republicans, as matters now stand, would give the democrats control. For Republican Control. Arizona would send two democrats and New Mexico two stand-pat republican senators. Therefore, with the senate in prospect of being so closely contested, it has become necessary to keep Arizona out and let New Mexico in. Discovery of this program has thrown the Arizona boosters and the New Mexico progressive into something very much like a panic. The enabling act which was passed for the two states at the last regular session provided that if the president approved the constitution adopted by the conventions and congress did not AT THE NEXT REGULAR SESSION disapprove, then the state should come into the union. The president has approved the New Mexico constitution. He has not approved that of Arizona. Therefore, if congress does not make any move whatever between now and the end of the next regular session, Arizona will be left out, while New Mexico, with its reactionary constitution, will come in automatically. Would Be Clear Republican Gain. New Mexico, thus admitted, would elect two stand-pat senators; it would give its four electoral votes to the republicans, and Arizona would not be there to offset this increase of republican strength. The legislative agents who are here from the southwest declare that the situation is getting most grave. Considered as a whole, it is probably more favorable to the Arizona constitution than that of New Mexico. But the extreme conservatives like New Mexico's unamendable document; and the enabling act has been so skillfully drafted with reference to the present situation that there is excellent prospect that New Mexico will win and Arizona lose. Arizona's people are willing to have a provision imposed on them, of re-submitting the recall of judges, so that the people may vote it out of the constitution if they choose. It was thought for a time that this compromise would be satisfactory. But the New Mexico constitution was brought under criticism by Senator Owen and others, who declared that it was absolutely a project for the perpetual establishment of an oligarchy of political property interests. This view aroused much opposition, and the stand-patters have become incensed. With control of the situation in their own hands, as they believe they are now prepared to consider shutting the door against Arizona, while letting in New Mexico without even providing an effective means of amending its constitution. If the progressive republicans and the democrats hang together, they will be able to pass a resolution looking to the admission of both states together. If this resolution contained the provision for re-submission of the recall in Arizona then the president would have no further excuse to refuse his signature. Senator Bailey, who led the fight last session against letting in Arizona, with its radical constitution, is believed now to be getting ready to act with his party. The Arizona people are confident that he will vote for a resolution to admit both states, provided the recall is to be re-submitted. If he takes this position, then there will be a fair chance for the two states to get in. The difficulty is that positive action is necessary to accomplish this. Delays, filibusters, non-action on one pretext or another preventing a vote during the present session, would push the matter over till next session; and if then a similar policy of masterly inactivity could be imposed, the end of that session would see New Mexico coming alone, while Arizona waits. Big politics are involved in the situation. Democrats do not fancy the prospect of a new republican state coming in at a time when it would possibly determine the political control of the senate. This argument has been presented most forcefully to democrats, and is having its effect. Senator Crane and Postmaster General Hitchcock are alleged to have taken general charge of the effort to let in New Mexico, but keep out Arizona. The people from the southwest are watching their moves with the greatest concern. New Mexico holds the strong card, because if nothing at all is done by congress, it stands to get in. The two territories thus cannot be played one against the other.

At the first New Mexico election a substitute for the article on amendments will be voted on. This substitute provides for the submission of amendments by a majority of the legislature and ratification by a majority voting thereon. The provisions regarding elective franchise and education are made less easy of amendment than now provided in the constitution. The provision in the enabling act providing a language qualification for holding office is repealed. Arizona will vote upon a substitute for the article on the recall. The resolution will undoubtedly pass the house next week. I believe a majority in the senate favor this resolution. Possibly an effort by some republicans will be made to prevent a vote in the senate. If delay occurs the republicans must bear the responsibility.
