

D. H. BOATRIGHT IS ELECTED BY 143 PLURALITY OVER SELLERS

Republicans Succeed in Placing All Their Candidates in Office Excepting Two Councilmen.

DEMOCRATS VICTORIOUS IN THIRD AND FOURTH

Heavy Vote Polled Despite Drizzle and Low Temperature; Mayor Sellers Gets Bigger Vote Than Previously

Republicans added to a democratic double-lead yesterday returned Albuquerque to their column, as they did in other cities of the state, by electing D. H. Boatright mayor over the present incumbent, Col. D. K. H. Sellers, by a plurality of 143 votes.

At first the race was a close one, but in the third and fourth wards the republicans carried the Third and Fourth, the former by a plurality of 29 and the latter by a margin of 14 votes.

315 SALOONS IN ILLINOIS VOTED OUT OF BUSINESS

The republicans made a clean sweep except in the Third and Fourth wards, where the democrats succeeded in electing their candidates. This gives the latter a majority of one on the aldermanic board, one republican and three democrats of the present council retaining their chairs for the year ahead.

Local Option Elections Nearly All Smaller Towns and Cities Go Dry; Larger Ones Show Divided Results.

The country that now shows the greatest gains in anti-saloon territory, had twice as many of the former wet territories as it had in the latter. This was the result of the following which were voted dry: Bloomington, Decatur, Galesburg, Canton, Freeport, Galena, Juliet, Mendon, Keosauqua, Lockport, Elgin, and East Galena. Rockford and Geneva previously were dry. The following cities remained wet: Sterling, Hannibal, Quincy, West Galena, Rock Hill, Oak Grove, Aurora, Watkinson, Alton and Moline.

MINNESOTA TOWNS GO INTO DRY COLUMN

St. Paul, Minn., April 7.—(Special) Towns voted heavily in today's municipal elections held by Minnesota cities of the fourth class according to returns late tonight. Madison, Marshall, Loveland and Grand Rapids, among the leading saloon towns of southwestern Minnesota, today entered the dry column by small majorities, and the anti-liquor forces pointed to this achievement as a great victory.

OLD BOARD WINS IN ALAMOGORDO

Gallup Shows Good Majority for G. O. P. Over Combination Ticket and Deming Re-Elects Hold Over Trustees.

Santa Fe, N. M., April 7.—A republican landslide today benefited the democratic-progressives fusion ticket although all of the three newspapers backed the latter. The republicans carried every ward and elected every candidate. State Auditor William G. Sargent defeated Speaker of the Legislative House Roman L. Baca for mayor by 722 majority, the largest majority given a majority candidate in a decade.

Henry Alford was elected city clerk over Arthur E. P. Robinson by 279 majority. J. H. Yamba was elected city treasurer by 352 majority. For aldermen, the following republicans were elected: A. B.
