TAXPAYERS IN FAVOR OF REDUCED SALARIES
Responding to an invitation issued by a special committee of the democratic county committee, a number of democratic taxpayers appeared at a meeting of the committee held in the Commercial club last night and expressed their views as to the taxation and county salaries plank to be adopted by the democratic county convention.
The committee which heard the suggestions of the taxpayers included Henry Lockhart, George C. Scherer and A. Fleischer.
The discussion was informal. The prevailing sentiment seemed to be that there should be a reduction of salaries paid all county officers, with the single exception of the salary paid to the county superintendent of schools, which in the opinion of a number of those present last night, should be considerably increased.

WHO IS WHO AMONG BOARDS OF DIRECTORS
The rather intricate question as to who is who and why, in two boards of directors, is the question, or one of the principal questions, which is being argued before Judge Reynolds in the district court in the case of the conflicting directors, against the Northwestern Consolidated Improvement Co. The two sets of directors, it is understood, each claim the right to direct the affairs of the Northwestern company, which at one time owned a large tract of land in northern Mexico. The company is a New Mexico corporation, James H. Garfield, former secretary of the interior, is chief counsel for the Northwestern company, and is here from Ohio to appear in the case. The arguments before Judge Reynolds will likely be concluded today.

ATTORNEYS ASK INVESTIGATION OF THEIR ACTS

State Treasurer Marron Petitions Supreme Court for Probe of His Firm's Conduct in Garcia Case.

State Treasurer C. N. Marron, on behalf of the firm of which he is a member, yesterday filed in the office of the supreme court of New Mexico a petition asking for a thorough investigation of the conduct of his firm in the celebrated Garcia inheritance case, recently decided by Federal Judge W. H. Pope, and at the same time addressed a letter to the board of bar examiners requesting that such action be taken as will permit of all the facts in the case being presented to the supreme court in an official manner.
It will be remembered that in his opinion in the Garcia case Judge Pope made severe strictures upon the manner in which the case had been conducted by Mr. Marron's firm, representing the plaintiffs, and it is the purpose of bringing up in an official way the correctness of Judge Pope's findings of fact on this question that the petition was filed and the letter written.
Serious Reflections Made.
The petition to the supreme court, after reciting that the petitioners are members of the bar of New Mexico, states that "in an opinion recently rendered by Judge William H. Pope, of the federal district court for the district of New Mexico, serious matters are contained reflecting upon the character and professional conduct of your petitioners, not only as members of the bar of that court, but also as members of the state bar, a copy of which opinion we hereto annex for your information.
"We therefore respectfully request this honorable board to take such measures as in your opinion may be necessary to the end that our conduct touching the matter referred to in that opinion may be fully investigated by your board, and ultimately by the honorable the supreme court of the state, so that we may make full disclosure in regard to our connection with this case for the information of the court and the members of the bar and the public."
Letter to Examiners.
The letter addressed by Mr. Marron to the state board of bar examiners is as follows:
"We are inclosing herewith petition in the matter of ourselves, which petition discloses its nature. We have today transmitted to the clerk of the supreme court the original of this petition, advising him that we enclosed a copy of you a copy.
"The nature of the matter referred to in your petition is such that we would very much appreciate early action by your board, and in view of the fact that the matters referred to involve the integrity and standing of our firm, and each member thereof, we would like a hearing upon these matters by the supreme court, so that a full record could be had thereof."
"We hope, therefore, that such action will be taken by your board at a very early date to the end that we may be able to have presented to the supreme court all of the facts and all of the circumstances and that we may make a full disclosure in this matter."
Marron Explains Action.
State Treasurer Marron yesterday explained the action that he had taken in bringing the matter thus officially to the attention of the supreme court and the state bar examiners.
"I feel," said Mr. Marron, "after a careful study of Judge Pope's opinion in the Garcia case, that a grave injustice has been done by my partner and myself. The impression has been created, so I am informed, that my firm, or some member of the firm, was concerned with the falsification of letters and the change of postage stamps forming part of the documentary evidence in the Garcia case. In fact, we are prepared to show the impossibility of such being the case.
"In justice to ourselves and to our client, the only thing we could do was to bring the matter up in an official manner and show our entire innocence of any illegal or unethical conduct in the case."
ALBUQUERQUE HAS FINE CHANCE TO LAND MOOSE SANATORIUM
Judge Edward A. Mann has returned from Milwaukee, where he attended the national convention of the Loyd Order of Moose as a representative of the Commercial club of Albuquerque. Judge Mann and Dr. H. L. Hunt, selected from the local Moose lodges, conducted a strenuous campaign at the convention in an effort to have Albuquerque selected as the place for the Moose tuberculosis sanatorium. Judge Mann believes that the sanatorium will be built and that Albuquerque stands a very good show to win out in the fight for the institution.

STIRRING CALL FOR MEETING OF NEWSPAPER MEN

President Nestor Montoya, of State Association, Declares It's Time for a New Deal and a Square Deal.

A call with a "punch" in it was issued yesterday by President Nestor Montoya for a meeting of the New Mexico State Press association, which is to be held in Albuquerque on August 17. Mr. Montoya tells of the many attractive features which have been arranged for the convention. He declares that it is imperative that the members get together immediately and plan for a "square deal." Moving pictures of the association meeting are to be taken under the direction of Col. R. E. Twitchell, of the exposition commission. Mr. Montoya advises the members of the fourth estate to come to Albuquerque equipped to pose for the movies. His letter follows:
"Albuquerque, N. M., Aug. 2, 1914.
"Members of the New Mexico State Press Association:
"Dear Sirs: The importance of attending the meeting of the association which will be held in Albuquerque August 17, 1914, cannot be overestimated. The business to be transacted needs immediate attention for the welfare of the craft, so as to obtain a square deal which can only be brought about by united and concerted effort.
"Albuquerque, the convention city of the state, where hospitality and attention to visitors is always foremost and accommodations complete, is ready to receive you and welcome you royally. The local press will do all in its power to make your stay satisfactory and pleasant, and you can rest assured that Albuquerque never does things by halves.
"One of the most important features connected with the meeting has recently developed through Mr. A. E. Koehler, Jr., commissioner of publicity for the state exposition board of the San Diego national exposition, and through Colonel R. E.
