## AMARILLO ASKS CATTLEMEN TO CONVEENE THERE

Board of City Development Sends Printed Letters to Members Asking Them to Vote for That City.

That Amarillo is making a strong bid for the 1916 convention of the cattlemen of the southwest, is evident from information received by T. S. Mitchell. It is in the shape of a neatly printed invitation, which is being sent to members, urging them to vote for Amarillo.

"Dear Sir: Amarillo wants the Panhandle and Southwestern Stockmen's convention in 1916. The Panhandle is the home of the organization. Here it received the impetus which made its present staunchest supporters of the organization reside in the Amarillo country."

"We believe Amarillo is entitled to the convention next year. It seems not unreasonable to ask the child to come home once in three years. We believe the association will best serve its interests and the interests of its members by coming to Amarillo next year."

"We urge you to attend the 22 Paso convention early next month and solicit your vote in favor of Amarillo for the 1916 convention. While consistent of success, you should the majority rule against us, we need not bow to their will, though none the less convinced that in fairness, the convention belongs to us."

## HUNDREDS ARE SEEING AMERICA FOR FIRST TIME

Captain Spivey Finds Man Who Had Been to Europe Twenty-Three Times, but Never West of Chicago.

The European war, according to Capt. A. M. Spivey, has given strong impetus to the "See-America-First" propaganda. His experiences, however, suggest that it would come more nearly to fitting the case if it were replaced by "Seeing America last."

Last week, including last Sunday and yesterday, 2,227 tourists passed through the city on No. 2, according to figures available to Captain Spivey. Of this number 733 visited the Grand canyon of Arizona. The captain estimates that fully 10 per cent of the 2,227 had never before been west.

Captain Spivey met one man who had been to Europe twenty-three times and never before had been farther west than Chicago. He did not state whether it was the war, or the expositions that caused him to come west this year.

### EXCELLENT PROGRAM WILL BE GIVEN AT RODEY HALL TODAY

A program of unusual interest has been planned for the vesper service at Rodey hall this afternoon at 4 o'clock. The address will be delivered by the Rev. Edward P. Schuler, pastor of the Lutheran church, who is known as a forceful and interesting speaker. A fine musical program has been arranged by Prof. E. Stanley Seder, director of music at the university, which includes an anthem by the University Glee club, which, under the skillful handling of Director Seder, is fast becoming a factor in the music of the city, and a solo by Mrs. E. Other features of the service will be a duet by Professor Seder and Robert T. Sewell, a selection by the University Brass quartet, which has already won such high favor with church and concert audiences of the city, and a delightful cornet and horn duo by Charles H. Clarke and Robert W. Barnes, both members of the brass quartet. From the standpoint of the audience, the best numbers on the program will probably be several choruses by the choir and brass quartet. Those who have heard congregational singing, led by a quartet of brass instruments, need not be told of the inspiring effect.
