SELLERS ACTIVE FOR FEDERAL AND FOR AUTO ROAD

Durango Democrat Tells of Albuquerque Man's Plans for Highway From Gallup to Colorado Line.

Good roads enthusiasts all over New Mexico will read with interest the following story from the Durango Democrat of July 15. An active campaign for the completion of an automobile highway from Durango to Gallup, N. M., a distance of 175 miles, is now receiving impetus from all the commercial organizations of this section as the result of the visit here yesterday of Col. D. K. Miller and H. B. Dennis, of Albuquerque. Col. Miller and Mr. Dennis came to Durango and this section primarily to advertise the new New Mexico state fair, October 13 to 18, Mexico.

Started at Aztec. The Aztec Commercial club is in line with the movement on Tuesday morning the following resolution and sent it to Mr. Jones. The same resolution will be taken up and adopted and forwarded also by the Durango chamber of commerce, the Durango exchange, the Gallup City club, the Albuquerque Commercial club and the county road board of San Juan and Bernalillo counties. The resolution is as follows, and graphically explains the situation that it is sought to remedy.

Whereas, the county of San Juan, New Mexico, has completed an excellent highway from the Colorado-New Mexico line through the Animas valley, and through the towns of Aztec and Farmington to the line of the Navajo Indian reservation in the east.

Whereas, Mr. W. T. Shelton, agent for the Navajo Indians at Shiprock, has caused to be constructed an excellent highway from Jewett to the Indian agency at Shiprock, and the Navajo reservation south and west of the town of Gallup; and

Whereas, the town of Gallup and the Navajo Indians road board stand ready to reconstruct the highway from Gallup to the line of the Navajo Indian reservation; and

Whereas, there remains ungraded and unfit for use by automobiles and other fast vehicles a gap of twenty-five miles, more or less, within the county of San Juan, between the jurisdiction of Superintendent Parquet of Fort Defiance; and

Whereas, the completion of the road from the Colorado-New Mexico line to the town of Gallup would be of great commercial value to the community and would, especially of value to the Navajo Indians as opening their reservation to desirable trade connections in all directions.

Therefore, it is resolved, that we, the undersigned, hereby request that Hon. A. Jones, first assistant secretary of the interior, in request the bureau of Indian affairs to immediately instruct the said Superintendent Parquet of Fort Defiance to use the resources at his command to construct and complete the road from the Colorado-New Mexico line to the town of Gallup, and that the Navajo reservation be immediately reconstructed under the jurisdiction of Superintendent Parquet of Fort Defiance. It is of direct interest to your community that this portion of the road be graded and surfaced immediately and to that end we suggest that the route be surveyed by your county road board, the local commercial organization, or other organized body of the enclosed resolutions directed to Hon. A. Jones, assistant secretary of the interior, and the forwarding of them to Mr. Jones without delay.

Quick Time to Construct. Colonel Sellers declares the automobile highway will enable persons living in Durango to leave here one day and arrive in Las Vegas, Nev., before they could get there by train. Sellers through his possession through Durango each way every day. Twelve hours is considered sufficient at the rate of fifteen to seventeen miles an hour to reach Gallup from here, says an "Enterprise" at 5 o'clock this afternoon. He says he will drive there tonight, and take a coach like a Pullman sleeper and arrive in Las Vegas the next evening and will reach San Francisco in 10 days. The road now, Colonel Sellers explains, is good enough for ordinary travel and to make the time mentioned by the shipping up of an auto road through the Fort Defiance agency will be extremely comfortable and perhaps a little faster.

ALDERMEN HAVE WEIGHTY MATTERS FOR SETTLEMENT

Some Action May Be Expected Tonight on Any or All of Questions of Importance They Are Striving to Adjust.

With the water franchise, central heating plant franchise and the other ordinance still before the aldermen, it is not surprising that some of the council members tonight will be busy with the water franchise ordinance, which will be considered on Tuesday. The council completed its progress so far as it has been definitely organized upon the water question with the aid of the Thursday night meeting last month. Since then no meeting has been held, with the exception, of course, of the special times sessions, and the council has given no indication as to what its next step will be. This may be determined at the meeting tonight, which will be held at 8 o'clock. The water franchise ordinance, which is now before the council, has been drafted by the Water Supply company, and is intended to give the company the right to supply water to the city.

May Spring Now Jitney Ordinance. The jitney ordinance is one of the second reading but whether it will go through may be determined tonight. The ordinance, which is now before the council, is intended to regulate the operation of jitneys in the city.

According to a report that would not be put down a jitney ordinance is to be submitted tonight. This would deal with not only the jitney but also the taxicab. An ordinance fixing taxicab rates may be of necessity at any time. The taxicab is now operating under the old license ordinance which has a rate for all vehicles used for the carrying of passengers. This ordinance is now being drafted by the city engineer, which the aldermen have not yet given a disposition to consider.

Reports to Be Read. The council and W. L. Staley are expected to come to terms on the heating plant ordinance. An ordinance has been drafted by the city engineer, which will be considered tonight. The ordinance is intended to regulate the operation of heating plants in the city.

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FIRST REGIMENT, U. S. G. HERE ON WAY TO FRISCO

Trains Stopped at Las Vegas Where 600 Officers and Men Drill; Regimental Band Gives Concert.

The first regiment of the Illinois national guard passed through Albuquerque last night en route to the Fort Huachuca, expedition at San Francisco. In the regiment were 800 officers and men. They are on three trains, the first of which arrived here at 11 o'clock, the second at 11:20 and the third at 1:20 o'clock this morning. The last was known as the Mayor's special because of the fact that Mayor William Hale Thompson of Chicago was aboard.

The regiment was to have stopped here several hours, according to its original schedule. The schedule of the train was finally determined, however, and the commander found he could not reach this city until late at night the stop was changed to Las Vegas.

The first train arrived at Las Vegas at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon and the officers at short intervals thereafter. The regiment detained upon the arrival of the first two sections and paraded through the town.

At Lincoln park the men stacked their arms and were given time to listen to the address by the chairman of the regiment, the Rev. Mr. McClain of Chicago, and the band concert held under the auspices of the regiment.

Company K of the first regiment is one of the best known organizations of national gardeners in the middle west and is noted for the notable work among its members. Captain J. H. Smith is the president of the company and is noted for his work in the country and Sergeant H. E. Darrow being a member of the Illinois state rifle team which represented the state at the national meet at Camp Perry, Ohio, last year. The company has won practically all of the various cups and trophies placed in competition by the regiment and its expansion has been in the line for many years.
